Ontario Services To Be Held Today For Mrs. Sadamori

Services for Mrs. Tsuyano Ouye Sadamori will be conducted at 2 o'clock this afternoon, May 19, 1966, at Community Methodist church in Ontario, with the Rev. George Uyemura officiating.

Mrs. Sadamori succumbed Sunday at Malheur Memorial hospital, following a sudden heart attack. She was born July 13, 1893, in Japan, a daughter of K. and Kuma Ouye. She came to the United States in August 1914, and shortly thereafter was married to Tagaro Sadamori in Tacoma, Wash.

The family moved to the Nyssa area approximately 20 years ago, and in 1953 Mrs. Sadamori received her naturalization papers. She was a member of the Community Methodist church in Ontario and the Japanese-American Citizens' league.

In addition to Mr. Sadamori of the home, she is survived by three sons, George, Kaz and Roy, all of Nyssa; two daughters, Mrs. Elaine Sugiyama of Sacramento, Calif., and Miss Eleanor Sadamori of Seattle. Also surviving are a brother in Japan and six grandchildren.

Interment will be made in Evergreen cemetery under direction of Lienkaemper chapel of Nyssa. Active pallbearers will be Larry Fujii, Frank Doi, Kayno Saito, George Hirai, Mum Kawasaki and Hiroto Okano. Serving as honorary bearers will be close friends of the deceased.

Public Lands Group Sets Portland Meet; R. Smith Chairman

The Legislative Interim Committee on Public Lands, of which Representative Robert Smith of Burns is chairman, will meet May 20-21 at Multnomah courthouse in Portland. The session is being held jointly with the Natural Resources Interim committee from the state of Washington to discuss common problems of the north-west region.

Byron Mock, vice chairman of the Congressional Public Land Law Revision commission will be at the hearings. He is an attorney from Salt Lake City and was appointed by President Lyndon B. Johnson as one of the public members of the commission.

Purpose of the committee is (a) to retain and manage public lands and (b) to dispose of them in such a manner as to provide maximum benefits to the general public.

Representative Smith stated, "I am delighted that Byron Mock has consented to attend our May meeting in Portland since it is important to relate the Oregon story to the commission."
