The feeling of accomplishment can do so much for you. Just think what inclination can do toward spring cleaning, mending the children's socks or finding an interesting way to cook an economical cut of meat.

MOBILE HOME DWELLERS

. . . here are some tips for you from Mrs. Ivy Hilty, extension agent at Warm Springs. She held a series of educational programs to help families adjust to trailer living after their other homes had been frequently threatened with floods.

Because moisture can be a problem, she proposes these "don'ts." Don't hang wet laundry indoors to dry. Don't hang damp clothes in the closet; dry them first. Don't push beds and other furniture against the wall; mildew may develop. Don't close your mobile home tight; use ventilating devices provided or open a window.

Don't cook in uncovered pans. Don't iron damp clothes without providing ventilation to take care of the steam.

The smaller the home, the quicker the air becomes moisture-laden. Then, it condenses on windows, in clothes closets and any place where the air is stagnant. The heat from a light bulb in each closet and under the bed will help. So will a portable electric fan.

CIGARETTE TAX BILL—Purpose: Levies a tax of 4 cents per package on cigarettes. One-half proceeds applied to property tax relief; one-half divided equally between cities and counties. YES NO

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL EFFECTS: If the voters approve this measure, it is estimated, based on present population figures, that the state would collect an additional \$10,000,000 per year. Annual state administrative costs would be approximately \$155,000 plus distributor costs of affixing stamps, estimated at \$430,000. The 50 per cent of net collections earmarked for property tax relief would amount to about \$4,925,000 annually, or \$1.50 per \$1,000 of assessed value, beginning with 1967-68 property tax rolls.

The 50 per cent share divided equally between cities and counties would yield about \$2,460,000 in additional revenue for each. Each city would receive about \$2.20 per resident and each county \$1.25 per resident.

Due to the payment dates set out in the measure, anticipated collections in the first year (1966-67) would be less than estimated in the previous paragraphs.


