#### HOMEMAKERS CAN SAVE ON FOOD BILLS

. . . with these tips from Mary Holthouse, extension food marketing specialist at Oregon State university.

If you save two cents per serving on two items of fruit or vegetables daily for two people, this saves you 56 cents a week. Boneless meat at one dollar a pound is a better buy than meat with 50 percent waste at 69 cents per pound.

Watch for sale specials—these alone can save 10 percent on the food bill, if you can use them.

Know the stores where you shop. Most stores specialize and feature certain products. You can probably save by shopping two stores regularly, maybe more by shopping three stores. But count also the costs in time and energy going from store to store.

#### BUYING A NEW APPLIANCE?

You might be interested to know how other people go about it.

A recent survey of 2000 women shows that factors influencing consumers in order of importance were recommendations of friends, shopping and comparing, and their own experience.

We're glad to see comparison shopping ranks high on this list. If you need more information on what to look for and ideas for questions to ask, our bulletins will help you.

Each bulletin deals with a different appliance—freezers, refrigerators, washers, dryers, irons and ranges. Just ask your county extension agent for a free copy of any you can use.

#### MANY PARENTS WORRY

. . . because their children seem to like dessert better than vegetables. Mrs. Roberta Frasier, family life specialist for the Oregon State University Extension service, says that in this case, take a look at what you have been teaching.

If you've used dessert as a reward for eating all the food on his plate, or all his vegetables, a child will value it highly.

If this isn't what you want to teach, take a different approach. Let him have his portion of dessert whether he eats all his vegetables or not. This will de-emphasize it. The child will be better off in the long run, especially if dessert is well selected.

#### WHAT CAUSES SUDS TO "DIE DOWN"?

. . . If you've been using a sudsing type of detergent or soap for dishwashing or laundering, this is a sign that the cleaning product has been used up; it has attracted all the loosened soil it can hold.

In order to get complete soil removal, you'll need to add more soap or detergent. Otherwise, the soil will not be completely removed and will stay in suspension.

Removal is important because redeposited particles of soil are particularly difficult to remove.

#### IF INTERRUPTIONS RUIN YOUR GOOD INTENTIONS

. . . and you feel nothing gets done, take the word of a young mother of two pre-schoolers. She works part-time and her minutes at home must count.

She tried making a list of jobs she could do in five minutes, another list of jobs that take about 15 minutes. She finds this is one way to use those little bits of time. When the children are awake, she plans to do the jobs that don't call for concentration.

You'd be surprised how many chores you put off, that actually take only five minutes once you get started doing them.

#### DON'T LET MOTHS PICNIC

. . . on your stow-away woollens this summer. Discourage them by using special preparations in the water for washable woollens. This way moth-proofing is combined with washing, either by hand or in the machine. There's no odor on the clothes.

#### your hands in the wash water. Treat an infant's sweater or blanket only if it is to be stored. When you are ready to use it again, have it dry-cleaned first.

Woolens that can't be washed should be dry-cleaned, hung outdoors and sprayed with a moth-proofing chemical. Let them dry and then store.

. . . here's a confidential cleaning tip. Take a man's eye-view of dirt. It's easy to remember to clean the things you can see. But if your husband is much taller, you'd better climb on a step-stool and see what there is around the house at his eye level!

Petite homemakers might be horrified to find visible dirt on top of the refrigerator, room dividers, shelves and other high spots.

In dusting a room, it's best to start at the top by hunting for cobwebs near the ceiling, then work your way down. Falling dirt can be picked up by the vacuum if you clean the floor last.

WHEREAS, at a special election held in the City of Nyssa on the 17th day of May, 1966, there was submitted to the legal voters of said City of Nyssa the proposition of adoption of a proposed amendment to the Charter of the City of Nyssa by adding thereto a new chapter authorizing the Common Council of said City of Nyssa to acquire the building and lots known as 319 Main Street, in the City of Nyssa, being Lots A, B and C of Block 1 of Teutsch Addition to the said City, to renovate and remodel said building for use as a public library, to construct auxiliary reading rooms therein, to purchase and install library furniture, fixtures, equipment and other library accessories as well as the purchase and installation of additional library books, to issue and sell General Obligation Bonds of the City in an amount not exceeding \$60,000.00 to provide funds therefor and to provide a tax levy to pay the principal and interest on said bonds; and

WHEREAS, the returns of said special election have been duly filed with the City Recorder and have been duly canvassed and examined by the City Council of the City of Nyssa; and

WHEREAS, it appears that a total of 265 ballots were cast at said special election on said proposition, and that 205 ballots were cast in favor of the proposition and were marked "500 X Yes," that 59 ballots were cast against the proposition and marked "501 X No," that one ballot was voided and that a majority of said votes were cast in favor of the adoption of said amendment to the Charter of the City of Nyssa.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Grant H. Rinehart, mayor of the City of Nyssa, do hereby proclaim that the proposed amendment to the Charter of the City of Nyssa, as submitted to the legal voters of the City of Nyssa, pursuant to Resolution No. 261 adopted the 26th day of April, 1966, has been approved by the legal voters of the City of Nyssa and does become effective as of the close of said election on the said 17th day of May, 1966.
