

Pilgrimage Takes Mauldings to Holy Land

Couple Tours Africa, Asia, Europe; Visit in Athens With Lena Kalaya

Dr. and Mrs. L. A. Maulding recently returned from a memorable trip to Africa, Asia Minor and Europe. A highlight of their journey was a visit to the Holy Land. The Mauldings left New York on March 13 by jet plane and landed at Amsterdam where they spent one day, and among places of interest they visited were the diamond markets.

They then went to Cairo where they visited the King Tutankhamen museum and viewed the royal belongings and jewelry.

Due to a dust storm, their plane was grounded, so the Mauldings then took a train to Luxor where King Tut's mummy is entombed.

Farming by Ancient Methods

The couple said they were elated with the train trip as they got to see the Egyptian people and their native customs of 3000 years. Farming was being done with wooden plows, drawn by water buffalo. And instead of modern equipment, the men were carrying the dirt in buckets to construct Aswan dam.

They visited Jerusalem and the Holy Land and while there, stayed at a hotel on the Mount of Olives. They visited many of the historical sites, but found that their most inspiring moments were those they spent viewing the sacred places from their hotel window.

The Mauldings say they were amazed at the apparent great wealth in Beirut, capital city of Lebanon.

Visit With AFS Exchangee

Athens was another place of interest visited by the couple. And of special interest to the Nyssans is their visit with Lena Kalaya, the very first AFS exchange student to attend the local high school while residing with the Grant Rinehart family, next door to the Maulding home.

Lena now weighs just 80 pounds and the Mauldings say she has a marvelous "sense of humor" and it would take a long time to find anyone more loyal to America. She teaches English in a Greek school, as well as giving lessons in Greek to American factory personnel.

She mentioned many times that she will never forget her Nyssa friends and would appreciate letters from them. The Mauldings urge that those friends write to her, as she is truly still interested in Nyssa and asked them so many questions about the town and its residents.

In Rome on Easter Sunday

On Easter Sunday, the Mauldings were in Rome and they arrived home on the following Wednesday, April 13, after spending one day with relatives in Chicago.

While on the trip, Dr. Maulding attend medical meetings with other physicians, surgeons, researchers and specialists. The sessions were held in Lebanon, Jerusalem, Cairo, Athens and Rome. Also among those making the trip were Dr. and Mrs. Dodds of Sheridan, Ore.
