

Chapel Rites Conducted Wednesday Afternoon for Edward A. Henderson

Final rites for Edward Alexander Henderson were held at 2 o'clock on Wednesday afternoon, June 1, 1966, at Lienkaemper chapel. Officiating clergyman was Ralph A. Lawrence of Nyssa Methodist church. Special musical selections were provided by the Rev. and Mrs. John Bullock.

Mr. Henderson, a retired farmer, succumbed Sunday morning at his home on route 2, Parma, after suffering a heart attack, although he had been in ill health for the past 3 1/2 months.

He was born Sept. 18, 1893, at Woodland, Maine, a son of Elmer N. and Jennie Ingram Henderson. The deceased attended schools in Maine and came west when he was 19 years of age. During World War I, he served with the 19th Balloon Battalion in France.

Move to Apple Valley in 1948

On Jan. 17, 1922, he married Lois E. Slack at Twin Falls, Idaho, and the couple farmed in that area until 1936 when they came to Nyssa. The deceased homesteaded a farm under the Owyhee project southwest of Nyssa and resided there until 1948 when he moved with his family to their present home in Apple Valley.

Family members report that he was fond of gardening and also spent much time in reading.

Survivors include his widow of the home; one son, Glen E. Henderson of Ontario; four daughters, Mrs. Gerald (Ramona) Davidson of La Mesa, Calif.; Mrs. Merilean (Winona) Robbins, rur-

She was born Sept. 5, 1906, at Drummond, Fremont county, Idaho, a daughter of Elisha and Ada Clark Newby. The deceased attended schools at Drummond for eight years and then moved with her family to Driggs where she entered high school.

She was an active member of the LDS church, served as secretary of the Sunday school at Valley View branch, Teton, Idaho, was a member of the church choir and attended seminary, studying Old Testament history.

The family moved to Nyssa where she met Farrell Ransom and the couple was married June 30, 1926, at Nampa, Idaho. They resided in Nyssa for one year following their marriage and then went to Buhl, Idaho, and Ely, Nev., for several years before returning here.

The family has resided in Nyssa for the past 35 years and during that time, Mrs. Ransom has filled numerous positions for the LDS church. She was presented a Primary award for 10 years' service.

Funeral services for Jack Dail Zittercob, a lifetime resident of the Nyssa-Ontario area, were conducted Saturday afternoon, May 28, 1966, at Lienkaemper chapel.

Pastors John Bullock and Armand Larive were officiating clergymen. Mrs. Bullock provided piano music and also sang "The Lord's Prayer."

Mr. Zittercob succumbed last Thursday afternoon enroute to Holy Rosary hospital following an apparent coronary attack.

He was born July 12, 1924, at Ontario, Ore., a son of John and Lillyan Dail Zittercob. He attended grade school at Arcadia and was graduated in 1942 from Ontario high school.

Two Children Survive

On Oct. 22, 1948, the deceased was united in marriage to Rosemary Hamilton at Winnemucca, Nev., and they became parents of two children, Ann, 15; and Tom, 10 years of age, both at home.

Mr. Zittercob was engaged in farming during most of his lifetime. For the past eight years, however, he was in the concrete ditch construction business.

He was a member of the Nyssa Eagles lodge and BPOE No. 1690 of Ontario. According to his family, he was particularly fond of hunting and looked forward to the fall months for opening of pheasant and big game hunting seasons.

Sabin Boosters Recommended

Dr. E. J. Wainscott, Malheur county health officer, has announced that it had been previously thought by some authorities that the administration of oral Sabin polio vaccine furnished lasting, long-term immunity against poliomyelitis.

The health officer said, "It has come to our attention, however, that Lederle manufacturers which furnish our oral vaccine recommend a booster dose of Sabin at two- to four-year intervals to keep up a safe immunity level."

"Since the large clinics for oral polio immunization were held in Malheur county in the fall of 1962, it would seem advisable for those who have not had a booster since that time to contact their family doctor for booster protection before the polio season arrives."

In years past, Malheur county was a high polio incidence area, but since immunity to polio was established through immunization, very few cases have occurred. This can very well be reversed if booster doses are not given as needed.

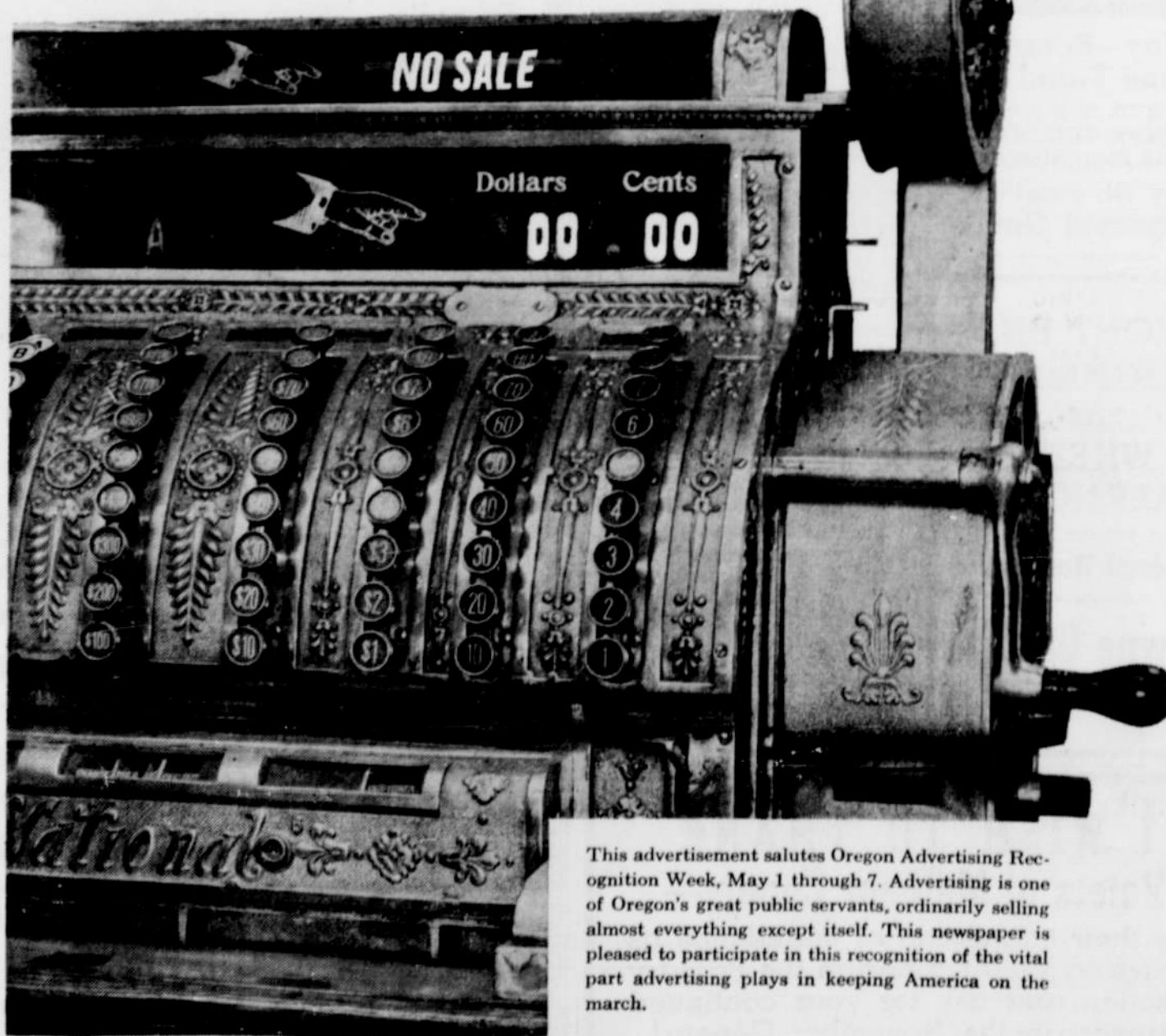
