

## Attack Claims Life of O. P. Council, Long-Time Resident of Sunset Valley

Funeral services for Owen Parker Council were conducted Tuesday morning, May 31, 1966, at Lienkaemper chapel. Officiating minister was the Rev. Ralph A. Lawrence of Nyssa Methodist church.

Mr. Council succumbed Friday at his home in Sunset Valley after suffering a heart attack. The youngest of six children, he was born Feb. 27, 1889, at Smith Center, Kan., a son of John Jacob and Sarah Ellen DeVere Council.

When a young man, he moved with his family to Sealing, Okla., and on Oct. 14, 1915, was united in marriage to Neva Goodrich.

In 1916 the couple moved to Kim, Colo., where they homesteaded and lived until 1937. Mrs. Council succumbed Oct. 12, 1946, and on Jan. 22, 1948, the deceased was married to Mrs. Lois Moore Knottingham. Shortly after their marriage, the couple moved to the Knottingham farm where they have since resided.

As a young man, Mr. Council lived the life of a pioneer as farmer, cowboy and horse breeder, working in Oklahoma, Idaho and Colorado. After farming during the drouth years in the dust bowl, he brought his family to Nyssa to make their home. His occupations here have included farming, farm-related work and ditch riding for the North Board of Control.

In 1955 Mr. Council suffered a heart attack which curtailed his activities and he retired, but continued to live on the farm. After his retirement, the deceased developed many hobbies including rock collecting, leather work, antiques and letter writing.

He was a member of Nyssa Methodist church, Oregon Trail Grange and numerous other community organizations. Together with his wife, he had been an active member of the Senior Citizens' group in Nyssa.

In addition to his first wife, Mr. Council was preceded in death by a son, Elton Council, who succumbed July 7, 1950.

Survivors include his widow of the home; three sons, Joe of Yakima, Wash.; Chester, New Plymouth, Idaho; and Harry Council, Denver, Colo.; two daughters, Mrs. Robert (Effie Ellen) Smith Jr. of Nyssa and Mrs. Clarence (Vera Fay) Keller of Santa Barbara, Calif.

Also surviving are a brother, William Council of Waco, Texas; a sister, Mattie Betts of St. Joseph, Mo.; four step-sons, John Knottingham, Nyssa; Frank Knottingham, Port Orford, Ore.; Glenn Knottingham, Caldwell; Paul Knottingham, Telegraph Cove, B. C.; and 23 grandchildren.

Active pallbearers were Charles Moore, Tom Nishitani, Harold Snyder, Brent Folkman, Ed Mason and Lyle Miner. Interment was made in Nyssa cemetery under direction of Lienkaemper funeral home.

### IT'S YOUR LAW

**THE U. S. MARSHAL**  
A judge can make decisions, reach judgments and issue orders, but somebody has to carry them out. On the state level, our sheriffs do this, but for the United States courts the U. S. marshal and his deputies do the work. The U. S. marshal is a kind of federal sheriff named by the President to serve for four years. He takes orders from the Department of Justice and the judges of the court he serves. The marshal, like the sheriff, has his deputies. They make arrests on federal warrants, serve papers in lawsuits in the federal courts, subpoena witnesses, summon the jury and seize property on federal court writs.

The marshal also manages the money set aside for federal courts, paying federal judges, witness and jury fees, the board and room of federal prisoners held in local jails.

Unlike the county, the federal government has no local jails. So, the marshal keeps prisoners awaiting trial or commitment in county and city jails at federal expense.

For prisoners held a few hours while waiting to appear for trial or to make bond, the marshal usually has a small lockup in his office. The marshal transports prisoners to the jails in which they are to be held or serve time.

There is often excitement in the marshal's work, but mostly he follows through for the courts. In the old days when much of the west was territories instead of states, he often had the job of local law enforcement now taken over by the police and the county sheriff.

### SOME HOMEMAKERS WASTE ABOUT HALF

of their lettuce through improper storage, says Mary Holt-house, Extension food marketing specialist at Oregon State university.

Lettuce may develop brown spots all through the head and much of it is not usable. To prevent these "freckles," store lettuce apart from fruits which normally give off ethylene gas. These include apples, pears, melons and tomatoes, to mention a few.

One good way to keep lettuce is to wash, drain and wrap it in a towel. Then place it in a plastic bag in the refrigerator.
