The award, first in the history of the "E for Export" program was given jointly by the U.S. Departments of Commerce and Agriculture, and was presented in official ceremonies at Portland and Boise. Pacific Supply, which serves 117 member associations in Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Utah and northern California, was cited for its achievements in substantially increasing the export of northwest farm crops to markets throughout the world.

Big Game Regulations Established For '66 Season by Oregon Commission

The Oregon Game commission, May 26, set big game regulations for 1966 with few changes made in the tentative rules as previously proposed.

The buck deer season was set to open on Oct. 1 and extend through Oct. 23 for mule deer in eastern Oregon and through Oct. 30 in the blacktail areas of western Oregon. Unit permits will be valid in both areas from Oct. 15 through the remainder of the general season.

The commission reduced the number of antlerless permits in eastern Oregon by 1600. Cuts were made in the Baker, Deschutes, Grizzly, Interstate, Wasco and Paulina units.

Elk Season Dates Given

Elk season dates were set from Nov. 12 through 27 for Roosevelt elk and Oct. 29 through Nov. 27 for the Rocky Mountain species. The commission considered delaying the opening of the Rocky Mountain elk season an additional week, but advised hunters that a later opening would be given serious consideration when regulations are set next year.

No changes were made in the antlerless elk permits. A minor date alteration was made in the Mill Creek Watershed hunt to co-

incide with the Washington season north of the line.

Bear hunters will not be allowed to use dogs in areas where bear have been classed as game animals from Oct. 28 through Nov. 27. Archery hunters were allowed the Sumpter area, which was a reinstatement of a season held last year. In addition, the commission struck out a portion of the Canyon Creek refuge which would have been opened to rifle hunting during the general season.

Antelope Season Set in August

A controlled season for buck antelope was set for Aug. 20 through 24 with 775 tags authorized. Limited hunts for bighorn sheep and mountain goats are scheduled for the last week in September. Three sheep and five goat tags are authorized.

Hunters seeking wilderness-type hunting will have the opportunity in an early buck season scheduled for the high portions of the Cascade and Willowa mountains.

The commission retained the separate elk tags for Rocky Mountain and Roosevelt elk, but changed the boundary line from highway 97 to the summit of the Cascades.

In addition to the general seasons, the commission authorized six extended seasons for persons with unused deer tags and 13 controlled seasons to be hunted on controlled season tags.

A complete synopsis of the regulations will be available at license vendors to hunters by mid-June, the commission news release concluded.

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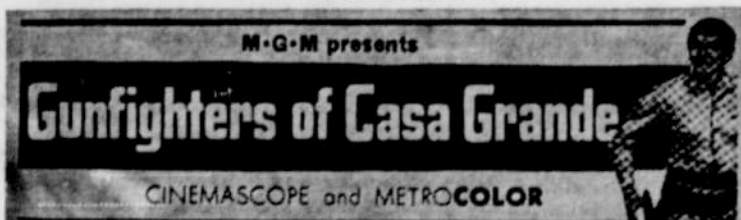
