Groups Discuss Tentative Regulations For Cigarette Tax Effective July 1

The Oregon Cigarette Tax Act, having become effective through acceptance by the electorate at the May 24 primary election will become operative at 9 a.m. Mountain Standard Time on Friday, July 1.

Tentative regulations prepared by the State Tax commission were discussed and reviewed with cigarette dealers and distributors at a May 27 public hearing at the State Capitol building. Opinions of those affected are sought by the commission before officially approving regulations.

Beginning at the operative hour, retailers will be required to add the tax at the rate of four cents per package of 20 to the selling price of unstamped cigarettes on hand and remit to the tax commission not later than July 20, 1966.

Packs Must Bear Evidence

Vending machine operators will be permitted to refill machines after the operative hour only with cigarettes that bear visible evidence of the tax having been paid. This evidence may be either a heat-affixed stamp, adhesive stamp or a meter imprinted impression.

Similar indicia will be required on all cigarettes commencing at the same hour, distributed to retailers by distributors. A tentative contract with the Meyerco company of Chicago, to be implemented only if the vote for the act was favorable, had been previously awarded for furnishing stamps to the state and application equipment to distributors and providing that all be available in the state by June 25.

A contract subject to similar conditions had been entered into providing for state-wide distribution of stamps and facilities for setting meters by local components of the United States National Bank of Oregon in an effort to impose the lightest possible burden on the distributors who must affix the indicia.

Distributors will, in turn, be compensated by means of a discount allowed when indicia are purchased at the rate of \$.00167 per package of 20, or approximately \$1 per case of 60 cartons estimated to amount to \$434,000 per annum as reimbursement for costs incurred in this effort.

Distribution of the proceeds will be made quarterly by the office of the secretary of state, after provisions for administrative expenses and refunds of the two quarters, estimated to amount to \$2,460,000 each per annum, assigned respectively to the cities and to the counties of the state.

Each city shall receive such share of one-quarter appropriated to all cities as its population bears to the population of all cities as determined by the latest census estimate of the State Board of Higher Education.

County Share Based on Census

The one-quarter allocated to the counties shall be distributed to each county in the same proportion as its population determined in the latest census estimate of the State Board of Higher Education bears to the total population of the state.

The remaining one-half, estimated at \$4,925,000 per annum, will be distributed annually after having been credited monthly to the local property tax relief account, as are the other funds distributed through that same account.

The revenue projections are based upon estimated sales in Oregon of 260 million packages of 20 cigarettes each during a year.

Yield: 6 1/2 cups

- 2 tablespoons finely crushed peppermint candy
- 1 pint peppermint ice cream, softened
- 4 cups milk
- 1 cup whipping cream
- Peppermint ice cream
- Crushed peppermint candy

In large mixing bowl while beating 2 tablespoons crushed candy and 1 pint ice cream, gradually blend in milk and whipping cream. Beat until frothy. Pour into chilled glasses; top each with scoop of ice cream. Garnish with crushed candy.
