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NYSSA VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT answered three calls during the past week. The first occurred on the A. M. Duff farm located on Enterprise avenue southwest of Nyssa. The land is leased by Duff to Norvelle Robbins. The department was called at approximately 11 p.m. Thursday, June 2, and firemen were on the scene 15 minutes later. Robbins reports that cause of the fire is unknown but it appeared to start in 30 tons of newly stacked hay which were lost, in addition to six farm buildings. Picture on the left was taken at approximately 12:30 a.m. after the blaze had subsided considerably. Light from the fire was still brilliant enough to blot out firemen pouring water on the conflagration. The



photograph on the right, taken Friday afternoon, shows remains after the blaze. At left, the fire can be seen still smoldering in the remains of the 30 tons of hay. At extreme right are remains of a new galvanized tin building which had an estimated value of \$2500. Saturday afternoon, the volunteers answered a call northwest of Nyssa to the old Ralph Jones farm, now owned by John Stringer. Corals and feed bunks were reported to be on fire with very little damage caused. The Farrell Ransom residence at 717 North First was scene of the third fire, Monday, June 6. A bed in the basement was ablaze, but caused little damage, with no damage reported to the house.
