Touring Specialists Observe Range Management Practices in Local Area

Ranchers in eastern Oregon are worried about the weather. This year the rain clouds lost their way and the range is dry. Cheatgrass gave up before it got well started. Except for irrigated fields, about the only green on the landscape is where good range management practices have been followed, observed Howard R. DeLano, president of the Pacific Northwest section, American Society of Range Management.

Good range management practices were what range technicians and ranchers went to see during a recent tour.

Sponsored by the American Society of Range Management, the tour was in Malheur county of southeastern Oregon.

Wells Provide Stock Water

Undesirable brush is being controlled with chemicals and brushland plows. Crested wheatgrass is being planted. Deep wells provide stock water distributed by plastic pipe to water troughs miles away.

Drift fences permit rotation of grazing use and periods for the plants to recover their vigor and produce seed. Even the touring range specialists were surprised to see how native grass bounced back into production with a change in method of use. In spite of dry weather, the grass produces good forage.

has been under way for four years. Over 153,000 acres have been reseeded. The goal is 428,000 acres. Brush control for grass release is complete on nearly a third of the 715,500 acres to be treated.

Nearly half of the 2,100 miles of fencing is done. Other rehabilitation measures include road construction, fire guard stations and lookouts, fire breaks and wildlife habitat improvement. Former reductions in grazing use are being restored.

The visitors agreed that good range management is a paying proposition.
