## Work Smarter . . . Not Harder

### YOUNG HOMEMAKERS

... have you checked up on your safety practices recently at home? Here is a partial list to use as a guide.

Turn handles of pans in on the range, wipe up spills from floor to avoid falls. Keep flammable articles away from fire. Store household cleaning aids out of reach of children and in properly labeled containers.

Respect water and know the danger to a child in the tub, shower or swimming pool. Store sharp objects away from blunt ones. Require children to sit down when eating nuts and hard candies.

### IF YOU HAVE OLDER PERSONS IN YOUR FAMILY

... be sure that they have plenty of light beside the chairs where they read and sew.

At a recent Institute on Aging held on the OSU campus, one of the guest speakers, Dr. Wilma Donahue, University of Michigan, stated that by age 60, people need 100 percent more light and by age 80, over 300 percent more than when young.

During the longer summer days, it's easy to keep on reading without realizing the daylight has dimmed. Be sure to turn on the lights before the sun fades. Good light is important near steps to prevent falls.

### MARY HOLTHOUSE

... extension food marketing specialist at OSU, has told us about a new product which she thinks would be a way of working smarter, not harder.

It's fully cooked bacon, which comes wrapped in an aluminum foil packet. You simply pop the packet into the toaster and get back four slices of finished bacon. Instant bacon!

No muss, no fuss, but expect to pay a little for the convenience. This may not be in your local market now.

### WHEN YOU PUT AWAY WOOLENS

... and other out-of-season clothes, protect them from mildew and moths with one of the various moth control products you can get at a drug store. These also control mildew.

Check directions on the package for correct amount to use. Some plastics are damaged by these products. Remove buttons and other ornaments which might be affected.

Don't use a plastic hanger for hanging clothes in a garment bag to which moth protective products have been added.

### HOMEMAKERS OF ALL AGES

... have you ever figured your dollar and cents value to your husband?

A study has shown that if you had to pay an hourly wage to a substitute housekeeper, the cost would be about \$3000. Since this study was made a few years ago, you might add on several dollars for the sake of inflation.

### IF YOU'VE BEEN A DOUBTER ABOUT PANS

... with non-stick coatings, here's some of the best assurance of safety we can give. Small electrical appliances with this finish such as fry pans, griddles, irons, etc., which have the Underwriters Laboratories Seal (UL), have to pass the following tests.

The maximum operating temperature allowed is 570 degrees, because above that point there might be danger. They must have a durable thermostat which is good for 100,000 or more operations.

In other words, these appliances cannot get hot enough to cause breakdown of the finish or give off harmful fumes. And your cooking and ironing temperatures are safely below 570 F. Look for the UL seal as your assurance of safety.
