and no ditches installed for the distribution of the water.

With Idaho to share in the benefits and with most of the politicians there at that time being Republicans, they were moved out in the '32 landslide for Roosevelt. As a result very few, if any, people in Washington were familiar with the irrigation project, and many did not know it existed.

As Dr. Sarazin, and some older citizens, well remember it was a time of national drouth — banks were closed — people in many cases had neither food, shelter nor jobs and the new administration was interested in trying to restore the agricultural land productivity. (The Central states food basket was almost destroyed.)

This is when an administrative aide decided to plant shelter belts to protect the blowing soil areas. And this is the time when the administration removed the funds for the appropriations to complete the local irrigation project and make it usable.

This is where Marshall Dana comes back into the picture. Dr. Sarazin, Mr. Van Petten of Ontario and Frank Morgan of Nyssa began a frantic search to find someone with enough political "savvy" and importance to go to Washington to get the funds restored to complete the project.

After much discussion and searching Sarazin and Morgan decided that if anyone could do the job it was Dana. He was a good writer, an oratorical, convincing speaker, believed in the project and was enthusiastic about Roosevelt.

These men raised \$300 and sent Dana to Washington. He contacted a newspaper acquaintance close to the administration and was told it would probably be three weeks before he would get a hearing with the president. But, somehow he got a 10-minute audience the following morning and after an impassioned speech got the appropriation restored and was on the way back to Oregon with a part of the original \$300.

To this man, and to others previously named, is credit due for the completion of the project. Otherwise it might have been many years before being placed in use. They are truly the "Saviours of the Owyhee Project" and Dana was not just an old man that had reached his end—not to the people of Malheur county and southwestern Idaho.
