Changes in American Eating Habits Discussed by Agricultural Economist

If you are at all like that hard-to-find character, the "average American," you are probably eating less and enjoying it more nowadays.

The typical American eats approximately 220 pounds less food per year than he did two decades ago, according to a roundup of eating habits and costs compiled by Mrs. Elvera Horrell, extension agricultural economist at Oregon State university.

The most striking change in American eating habits during the past 20 years is not the drop in total amount consumed, however, but rather the shift in the type of food eaten, she adds.

More Poultry Consumed

Take poultry, for instance. In 1945, the average person ate 25.8 pounds of poultry. By 1965, this had jumped to 40.7 pounds. This year, each person will eat about 43.4 pounds of fried, broiled, barbecued or baked chicken and turkey, it is estimated.

On the other hand, Americans ate only 145 pounds of flour and other cereal products per per-

son in 1965, compared with 201 pounds in 1945. Less fresh fruit, vegetables and potatoes are being eaten now, but a lot more of these foods are on dinner tables in processed form.

The jump in consumption of various forms of processed potatoes, for example, has helped reverse a long-term downward trend.

Smaller Percentage for Food

While people are eating better quality food, they're also spending a smaller percentage of their income for food. In 1945, food took 22.1 percent of the spendable income. In 1965, by contrast, it took only 18.2 percent, leaving a greater percentage for other family items.

In fact, average spending on food takes a smaller proportion of total spending in the United States than in any other country. Food expenditures range from less than 25 percent in Canada, Australia and Denmark, to countries such as Taiwan and Korea, where more than half of spendable income goes for food. In Russia, the figure is 56 percent.

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
