Many people hope so, others say they really enjoy ironing. New durable press garments come out of the dryer wrinkle-free with no seam puckering. Slacks hold their sharp creases.

These fabrics are produced by a completely different process than the usual wash and wear fabrics, according to Elaine Carlson, extension clothing specialist at Oregon State university. They can be line-dried also, but the dryer gives better results.

An almost unlimited variety of items is available, from children's clothes and women's suits to slip covers and table cloths.

Durable press fabrics are a real boon to homemakers but there will always be some selected fine garments and linens which benefit from ironing.
