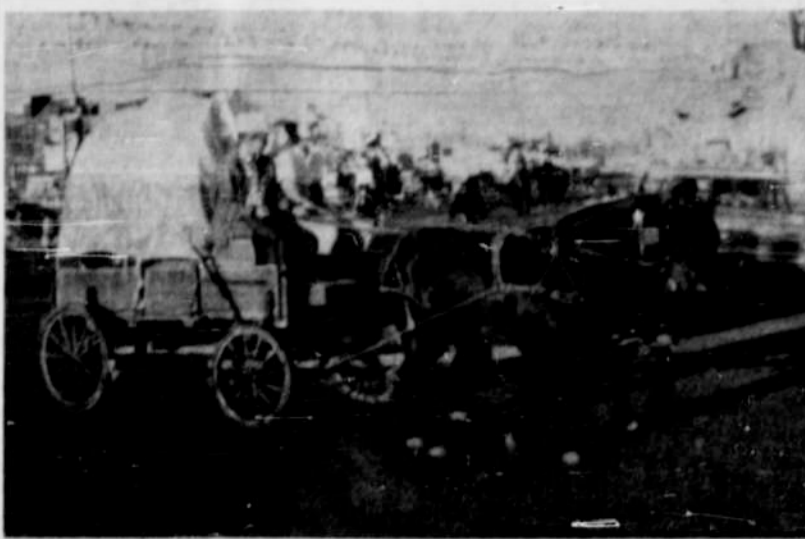
Get Letter From Europe
