

### Wednesday Chapel Rites Conducted For Fifty-Year Resident of Nyssa

Funeral services for Lee Gilbert Klinkenberg of route 2, Nyssa, were conducted Wednesday morning, July 13, 1966, at Lienkaemper chapel. Officiating was the Rev. Ralph A. Lawrence of Nyssa Methodist church. Vocalist was Oscar Bratton, with Mrs. Cecil Evans serving as organist.

Mr. Klinkenberg succumbed on Sunday in St. Alphonsus hospital at Boise following a two-day illness, apparently caused by a vascular artery blood clot.

He was born Oct. 7, 1907, at Tacoma, Wash., a son of Mr. and Mrs. C. Klinkenberg. The deceased began his schooling at Burns, Ore., and from 1917, when the family moved to Nyssa, until his high school graduation in 1927 he attended the local schools.

He was married June 19, 1938, to Ruth E. Wolfe at Weiser, Idaho. Mr. Klinkenberg was a member of Nyssa Methodist church and had been a beekeeper for the past 40 years.

In addition to his widow of the home, he is survived by six children, Daniel Lee of Caldwell, Charles Ernest of Ruby Valley, Nev., Mrs. Delvis (Katherine Margaret) Freeman of Springfield, Ore.; Timothy Eugene, 16; Eva Mae, 14; and Philip Allen, 10, of the home.

A daughter, Nancy Rose, preceded him in death during January 1947.

Also surviving are three brothers, William T. of Sebastopol, Calif.; Paul Lester of Nyssa; and Marion C. Klinkenberg of Portland; one sister, Mrs. Frances Lewellen of Vale; and one grandchild, Kristine Katherine Freeman of Springfield.

### Final Services Held For Former Nyssan Arthur C. Wilson

Final rites for Arthur C. Wilson, a former Nyssan, were conducted Saturday, July 9, 1966 at Aurora, Neb. He succumbed on the previous Tuesday following an extended illness.

Mr. Wilson was born April 23, 1888, at Marquette, Neb., a son of Calvin and Margaret Meixel Wilson. With his first wife, the former Eva Eckberg and mother of his four children, he resided on a farm in Nebraska until her death.

After Mr. Wilson remarried, he and his second wife, Marguerite, resided in Florida, then Arkansas and in 1942 moved to Nyssa. They operated the Wilson Nursing home here until approximately 1950 when they left for Portland where they resided for six years. And for the past 10 years they had lived in Phoenix, Ariz.
