YOUR FAMILY IS TOPS IN IMPORTANCE TO YOU!

Louis Oester, community and public affairs specialist with Oregon State university Extension service, points out that most families take out insurance in case of emergency but they seldom sit down and discuss what each person would do in event of a tragedy.

Ask yourself a few questions Do the children know what to do if they are home alone and the house catches fire? If something tragic happened to you, do the children know where to go for help?

Do you have a will? Are your important papers in a safe place known to other family members? Being prepared is another kind of insurance against emergencies.

in a doctor's office or at the restaurant if you use this trick suggested by Mrs. Roberta Frasier, Extension family life specialist at Oregon State university.

Mother can slip a bunch of colored pipe cleaners in her purse. Pull a few out at strategic moments and bend them to make dolls, airplanes and other things of interest to children.

Children can also group them according to color, or count them. Parents can find dozens of ways to use pipe cleaners to keep small tots quiet in a spot where they might disturb others.

GLASSWARE HAS A "MEMORY" FOR KNOCKS

Your old standby glass casserole or coffee maker may some day break with what seems only a simple bump. This is because it "remembers" the accumulation of knocks over the years. One more knock and it's had it!

The moral is — treat glassware kindly. Just because it survived a number of accidents, doesn't mean it will tolerate them indefinitely.
