WILL BACTERIA SURVIVE COLD WATER WASHING?

Ever since cold water detergents came on the market, this question has been asked many times. Now we have some research which gives us the answers.

U.S. Department of Agriculture studies show that more bacteria survive in cold water washing than in hot. Some of the survivors are capable of producing disease. Tests were made with both cold water detergents and the regular washing products.

However, there is something you can do to help. Tests show that when a disinfectant such as chlorine bleach is used, fewer bacteria survive regardless of water temperature.

If you're washing in cold water and the fabrics can take chlorine bleach, be sure to use it as directed on the bottle. In case of known illness in the family, you may prefer to stay with hot water washing plus the disinfectant.

"LIGHT BULBS DON'T LAST

as long as they used to," some people say. Maybe you haven't been aware of the trend toward using more light (a good idea for health) and larger bulbs in one fixture. Generally, the higher the wattage of a bulb, the shorter its life.

The newer long-life bulbs now available don't produce as much light per watt of electricity and actually cost more to use over their lifetime. They are handy, however, for out-of-the-way places where bulbs are hard to change.

Regular bulbs are the best buy, considering cost of the bulb, cost of electricity and light produced. And, did you know that one 100-watt bulb gives as much light as two 60-watt globes?
