

Nation Observes Farm Safety Week; Leaders List Tractor Driving Tips

How do you "gentle" an iron horse so it won't turn side-anticipate? ways, upside down or some other way that the driver doesn't anticipate? Leaders of Farm Safety Week, which is coming up in Oregon and nationally July 24-30, say the best way is to convince the driver that "Safety Is Victory Over Accidents"—which happens to be the theme for the week.

The tractor is the iron horse responsible for too many farm fatalities, says Neil Cullison of Oregon City, state chairman for Farm Safety Week.

The annual observance is one of the two major projects of the Governor's Committee on Farm Safety of which Robert C. Hollaway of Portland is chairman.

Experts have written pamphlets and brochures galore on how to "gentle" the tractor—how to use it so it won't be the No. 1 killer involving the use of farm machinery.

Important "Don't's" Listed

First, they have some "don'ts"—like don't allow children under 12, and then only able-bodied ones, to handle a tractor under field condition; and don't let anyone on the tractor with the operator unless there's a special seat. Don't touch revolving parts while the motor is running; and don't tow tractors behind high-speed vehicles or a driverless tractor behind another tractor. A final one . . . don't hurdle into the seat. (It's only an iron horse, you know!)

And as a refresher course on how to drive tractors—and to

show city folks this really takes expertise—these 16 tips come from the safety specialists and assume that the tractor is in good running order:

16 Suggestions Listed

1. Ride on the seat or stand squarely on a secure platform.
2. Be certain everyone is out of the way before you start.
3. Drive at speeds slow enough to insure a margin of safety—especially on rough ground or near ditches.
4. Set wheels as wide as possible, particularly when working uneven ground.
5. Watch for holes or ditches a wheel may drop into—keep a close eye on the rear downhill wheel when it comes to holes.
6. Reduce speed when turning or before applying brakes.
7. Lock brakes together when driving on highway or to and from the fields; always be sure brakes are evenly adjusted.

Other Tips Cited

8. Keep tractor in gear going downhill.
9. Stop the tractor and set brake before dismounting.
10. Stop to adjust or lubricate the tractor.
11. Stop power take-off before dismounting.
12. Stop the belt pulley to put on belt.
13. Wear snug-fitting, trim clothing.
14. Clean mud off clutch, brake and feet.
15. Never overfill the fuel tank—gasoline is liquid dynamite. If you overfill, wait 10 minutes for the explosive vapors to disappear.
16. Watch that drawbar when pulling a load or you may have a tip-over. The drawbar should be at least four inches behind the rear tires and 13 to 17 inches off the ground.
