

### City Librarian Gives Brief Reviews Of New Books Available to Patrons

Mrs. Max Urry, city librarian, reports the following books have recently been made available to patrons of the Nyssa library.

#### ADULT READING

"Rocks and Minerals" by Herbert S. Zim. A guide to familiar minerals, gems, ores and rocks.

"Honor Blackman's Book of Self-Defense" by Honor Blackman. Descriptions and illustrations of basic techniques of judo and karate, written by a motion picture actress.

"Elsa and Her Cubs" by Joy Adamson. The world-famous story, in photographs, of Elsa the lioness.

"This Half of the Apple Is Mine" by Joyce Lubold. The author has a theory that when Adam and Eve shared the serpent's apple in the Garden of Eden, they gained new responsibilities. So they shared their apple and set out to do the world's work together.

"How Far to Bethlehem?" by Norah Loftis. An English novelist weaves together the isolated stories of the three wise men and of Mary and Joseph.

"Memories of the Future" by Paul Horgan. A story of two American families with themes of love and sacrifice, peace and war.

"The Crippled Tree" by Han Suyin. A woman's autobiography that shows the conflict between ancient tradition and modern civilization, both in her life and in China.

"The Mandelbaum Gate" by Muriel Spark. The lives of Arab and Jew, Catholic pilgrim and British diplomat are entangled in this suspense-filled story of high adventure.

"The Lewis and Clark Trail" by Calvin Tompkins. A re-creation of the expedition that opened western America and a field guide to today's points of interest along the trail.

"White House Nannie" by Maud Shaw. The author, an English governess, tells of her years with Caroline and John Kennedy Jr.

"The Sinews of Love" by Alexander Cordell. A novel of a concubine in modern Hong Kong.

"The Raging Moon" by Peter Marshall. "Marshall . . . tells a tragic story, without illusions or comforting theories, but with candor and compassion."—The Times, London, England.

"Depths of the Earth" by William Halliday, M.D. An account of America's caves and their explorers, varied with adventure and history.

"Remember the Ladies" by Emily Taft Douglas. The story of great women who helped shape America.

"Saga of Chief Joseph" by Helen Howard. The story of the Nez Perce chief who acted as a diplomatic strategist, tribal and personal counselor, and conciliator in times of war and peace.

"The Fatal Impact" by Alan Moorehead. A narrative of exploration in the South Pacific—its adventure, purpose and disastrous effects.

"The Honey Badger" by Robert Ruark. A novel concerning contemporary American civilization and a proud man's quest for manhood.

"I've Only Got Two Hands, and I'm Busy Wringing Them" by Jane Goodsell. Experiences and advice, written by a mother who considers herself quite unlike the image of today's "Modern Mother."

"Report on the John Birch Society, 1966" by Benjamin Epstein and Arnold Forster. A study on how the organization works, both on its own and through other groups, to influence the course of American political life.

"A Country of Strangers" by Conrad Richter. The chronicle of a white girl captive of the Indians who is returned against her will to her white home.

"Better Homes and Gardens New Cook Book."

#### CHILDREN'S BOOKS

According to Mrs. Urry, a large number of books for children have been added to Nyssa library this summer. They include favorites of young readers such as 21 Dr. Seuss titles, several "Curious George" books and several collections of jokes and riddles by Bennett Cerf. #### VACATION IN SEATTLE

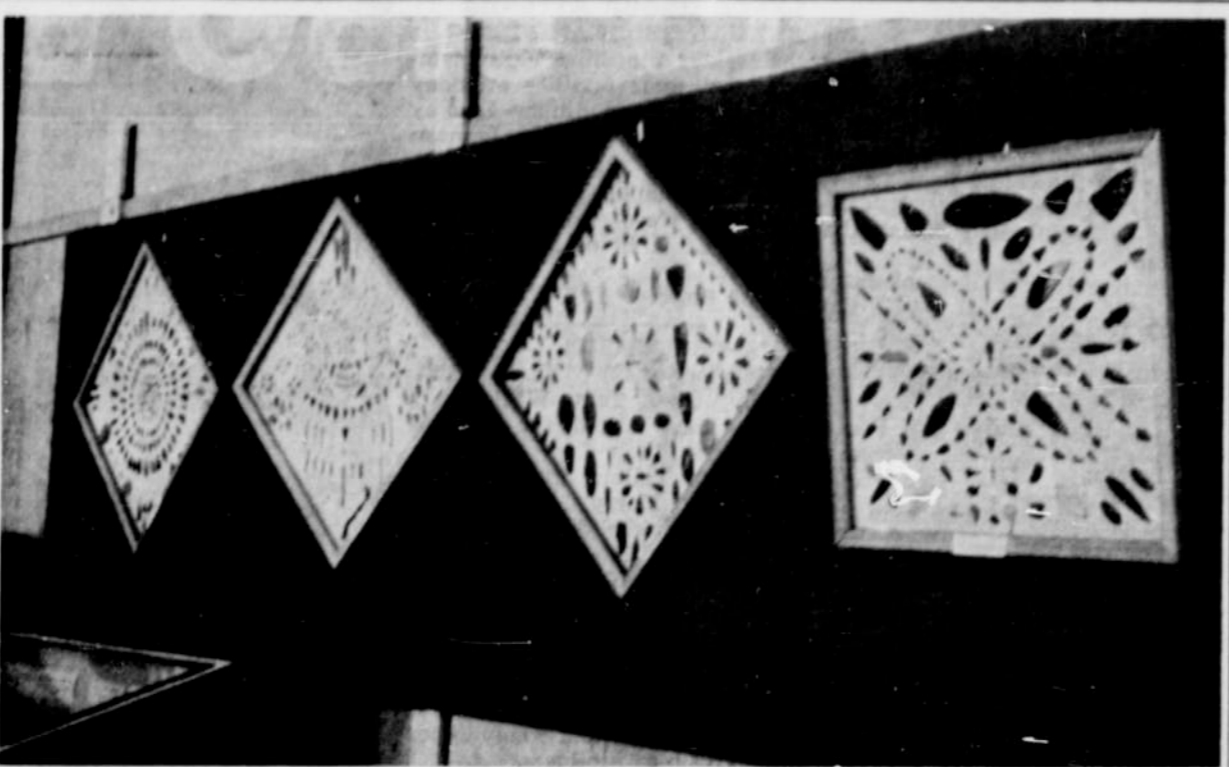

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that sealed bids will be received by the City Recorder of the City of Nyssa at City Hall, Nyssa, Oregon, until the hour of 1:00 o'clock p.m. on Tuesday, August 30, 1966, on which date, and at which time and place said bids will be publicly opened by the City Council of said City at the Council Chambers at said City Hall, for the purchase of City of Nyssa, Public Library General Obligation Bonds in the sum of Sixty Thousand and 00/100 (\$60,000.00) Dollars, said bonds being in denominations of \$1,000.00 each, all bearing date of September 15, 1966, and maturing serially in numerical order as follows:

The City Council of the City of Nyssa reserves the right to reject any and all bids.
