Mrs. McKague; her mother, Mrs. Hart; and the McKague couple's youngest daughter, Kelley, were all killed and other members of the family were badly injured. They are presently in the hospital at Oroville, Calif.

It has been reported that the McKague auto was traveling south when a car going in the opposite direction crossed the road in front of them and the vehicles collided near Oroville.

The Mike McKagues were notified later that their nephew and his eldest daughter had been flown July 29 by private plane to Portland where they were admitted to a hospital there.

They are both in very serious condition and it was reported that McKague will have to remain in the hospital for approximately six months.

Funeral services for his wife, mother-in-law and daughter were conducted Aug. 2 in Portland.
