GENTLEMEN:

We are pleased to announce that cold storage facilities for leaf cutter bee boards will be available at our Nyssa plant this winter.

The cost will be 50 cents per 3-inch x 6-inch x 4-foot board for the winter season. Other boards will be charged in proportion to their size. We plan to open the storage early in September. You can take the boards out whenever you are ready for them in the spring. Storage charges are for the season — so bring them in early!

Details of fire and theft insurance have been worked out with a local company. This insurance is available to you at a small additional cost, and charges are by the month.

We have investigated the benefits of bee board storage. Local Entomologists, County Agents and Seed Growers point out the following advantages:

1. Board storage at about 35 degrees Fahrenheit halts the activity of carpet beetles and other insect pests that work on the bee larvae.
2. Humidity can be kept at a level most favorable for the overwintering leaf cutter larvae.
3. In many cases the boards will be more secure from fire and theft. Insurance is available.
4. By using incubation after storage, the bees' emergence can be timed to meet the desired bloom period of your alfalfa. Also Monodontomerus — the small parasitic wasps — can be trapped.
5. Growers who stored boards with us last year are enthusiastic over results and say that they will be back again this winter.
