

Navyman J. Dail Discusses Conditions In Subic Bay, Vietnam Relay Center; Writes of Appreciation for America

(The following letter, written by Navyman Jack Dail, was received recently by his father, Nyssa Postmaster Lee Dail, who submitted it for publication in the Journal.)

Subic Bay, P. I.
Sunday, 31 July, 1966

Dear Dad and All:

Well, we are once again in Subic Bay. This seems to be our home away from home. There has been quite a lot of travel in and out of this port as it is the main relay center and repair facility for the Vietnam build-up.

Just about everything that goes to Vietnam, by ship, comes to Subic first. Last time we pulled in here there were approximately 30 ships in port, which included a couple of carriers and another troop transport.

Several times there were close to 12,000 men, consisting of both sailors and marines, on the beach in a single night.

Servicemen "Tangle"

This is a bad time for shore patrol duty, as there are always lots of fights between the two classes of servicemen. Also, the carrier groups hate one another and a few race fights occur.

About five marines and two sailors (all Negroes) jumped three guys off our ship and beat them pretty badly for apparently no reason at all. Nothing was done about it as our guys were pretty drunk and couldn't remember what the men looked like.

I don't know if I told you or not, but one third class seaman had shore patrol duty and had to stand outside a skivvie house to keep sailors from going in. They are always assigned in pairs so they'll be able to take care of trouble easier.

The two SP's told a couple of sailors to go away from the house as it was off limits. The owner of the house came out and told the guys to shut up or he would kill them.

SP Shot by Blow Gun

Later, one of the guys (SP) was walking away from the other when he noticed a Jeepney coming down the street with its lights off. He didn't think too much about it as it passed him, but he turned around and saw the other SP slump over and grab his chest. He ran over there and found the sailor had been shot by a blow gun.

He was lucky he was hit where he was, as very much lower and he may have gotten it in the lungs; a little higher would have been in the neck. The SP finally got help and they took the kid to the hospital where they had to remove the dart, as it was barbed on the end like a fish hook. He had lost quite a lot

of blood and was in serious condition.

"Gangsters" Attracted to Area

He is okay now and they identified and captured the Filipino who did it. As yet, we don't know what will happen to him. I guess that since the Philippines have become the main cog in supplying and replenishing of our forces in Vietnam, most of the Filipino gangsters have centralized around here and Clark Air Force base to capitalize on all the money that is spent, as all these troops draw their combat and regular pay and sit out at sea for several months at a time.

It is estimated, and probably quite a conservative one, that the servicemen spend an average of \$1 million a month in this town. It is about the size of Ontario normally and must have close to 25 or 30 thousand people here at least.

Sails for Da Nang

Well, tomorrow afternoon we set out for Da Nang again. I'll be glad when we finish our last trip there. It will be nice to start on that homeward journey.

With these two trips we stand a fairly good chance of getting combat pay. Our ship has to be in the surveillance area for six days out of a month. I think we'll be short about one or two days. It would be nice to get an extra \$65, but at least we'll get this month's wages free of tax, as all we have to do is be in the area for any length of time.

Guess you know the President signed the bill giving me an \$11 a month pay raise. That's all right with me. Every little bit helps.

Visits Seven Countries

When I return from this trip, I will have been to seven different countries, plus Hawaii. But I guess that won't be much of an accomplishment, as it is just a part of my job.

I sure do miss all of you and I'm looking forward to the passing of the next 61 days. The worst part will be actual steaming time from Yokosuka to S. D. It will sure be good to see all of you again.

You know, I've really come to realize the value of freedom and our progress as a nation. As a rule, all of these countries are so far behind us.

Some of the things I used to consider an ordinary possession I now think that we take them too much for granted and should be more thankful for the things we have.

People Want to Go to U.S.
No wonder people of these countries are amazed when they hear what America is like. Most everyone's desire over here is to go to the States.

And it's no wonder my fellow Americans, before me as well as now, fight so hard for our country. Any true American citizen would do the same if he really knew the great opportunities and ideals that he is upholding.

Take care now and give my regards to everyone. I am receiving the Gate City Journal and although it is always four or five weeks late, it still is good to receive. Write when you can.
