Appropriate games were played by the 26 guests in attendance with prizes being won by Eileen McConnel and Patty Irby.

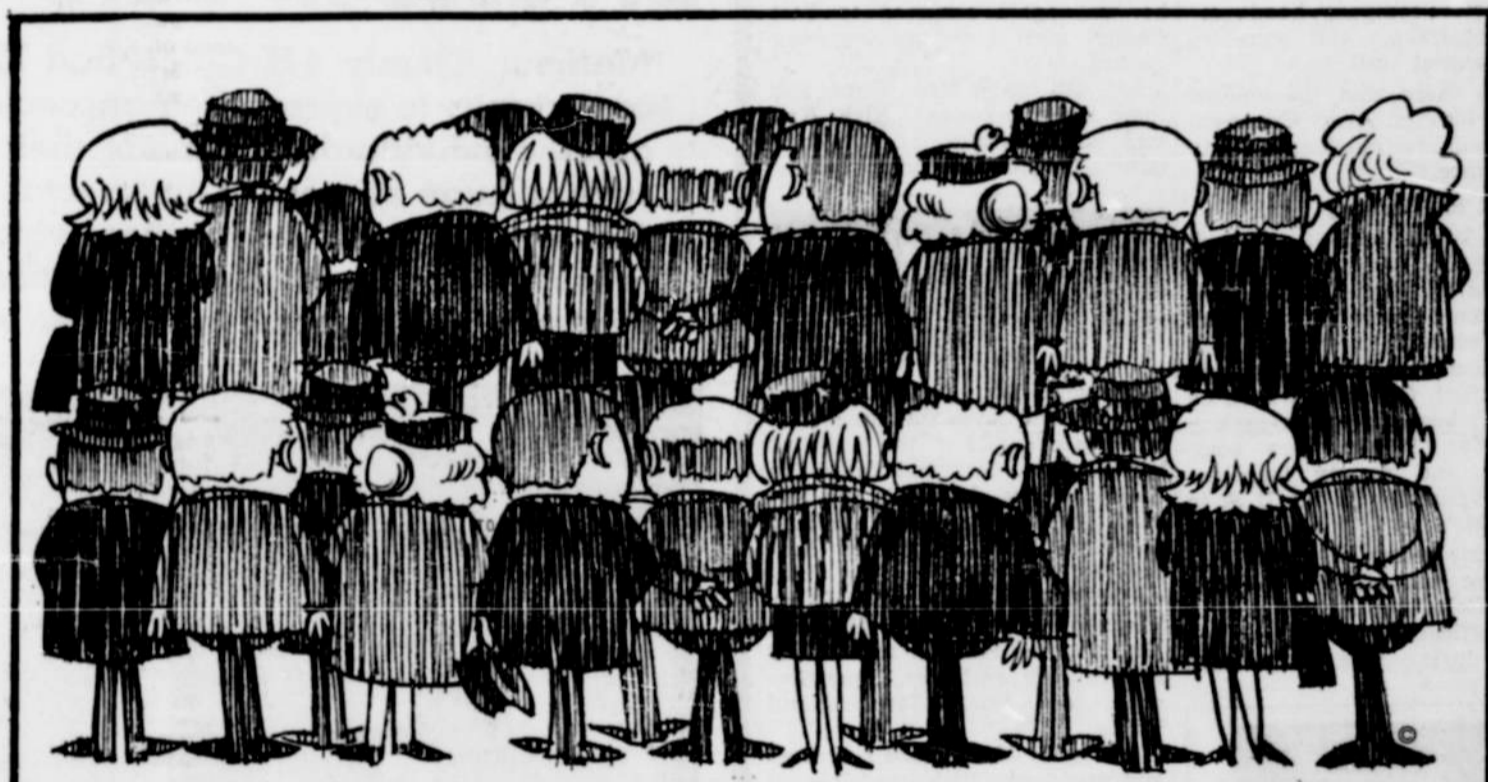
