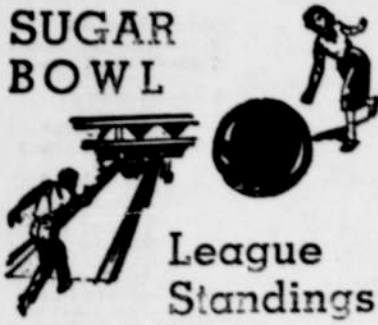


NHS Gridders Travel to Meridian For Saturday Game; Players Listed

Counselor Discusses Home Cooperation

ervation, the child almost inevitably conforms to the usages which he hears first and most frequently.

In a similar way, and in about the same percentage of cases, the home determines whether or not the child shall have sound health habits—whether he shall be industrious or lazy, reliable or uncertain, self-centered or public-spirited and generous.

Over and over again a teacher has worked earnestly and skillfully to develop an appreciation of good books, pictures or music, only to find her efforts have been wasted because there is not and never has been any home influence in the same direction.

Sympathetic Understanding . . .

The greatest thing parents can do is to get into sympathy with, and assist in creating an atmosphere in the home conducive to study and love for school tasks. Let the boy climb up on Dad's lap and be told a bear story.

Let parents, even though they cannot always comprehend the problems brought home by the children, evince a sympathizing attitude toward their efforts by suggesting, supplementing and sometimes studying with them instead of taking in theater parties or other social affairs.

Then all concerned will have gone a long way toward solving the problems of cooperation. Parents must get acquainted with their children; and to know them well means to live with them at home.

A Special Place And Time to Study . . .

Let each home set aside what might be called a study hour during which time all members of the family, if possible, and the children without exception, are required to do some real studying. Parents should see to it that the purpose of this hour is not violated.

There is nothing quite equal to the effect of a good example on the part of the parents in this matter. Children unconsciously acquire the attitude of their parents in this matter as well as others. There should be a light, comfortable, quiet place for home study.
