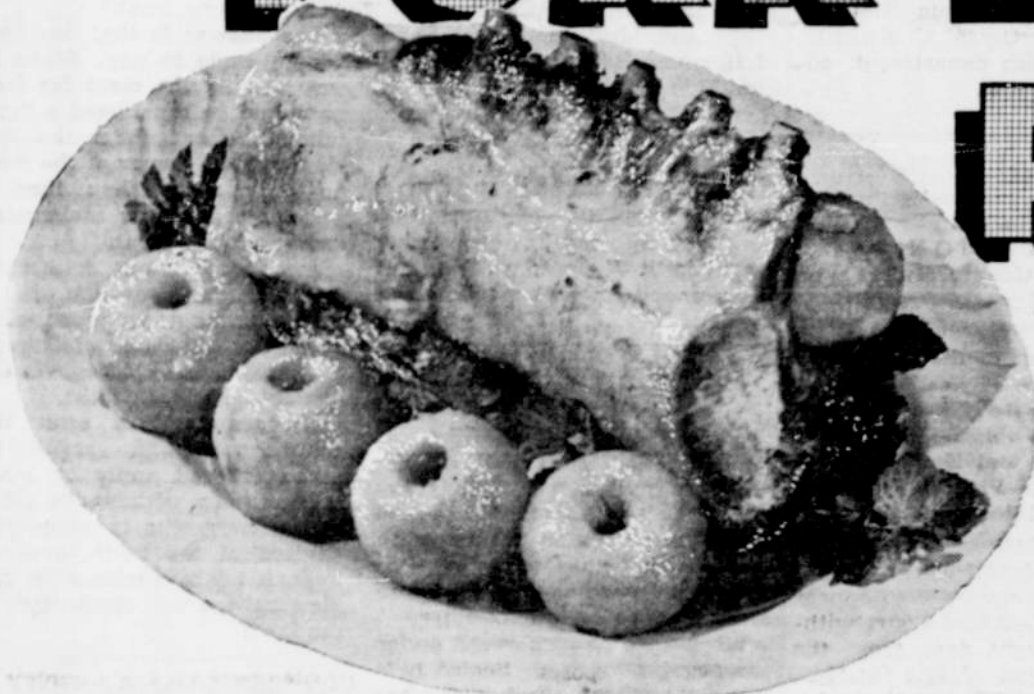
Folkman Host Picnic Dinner
