Work Smarter . . . Not Harder

LAWN SPRINKLING OFTEN ADDS TO WINDOW CLEANING PROBLEMS

Water spots get sun-baked on the glass and don't come off with usual washing methods. There's no one answer, because it all depends on which minerals are in the water. In some cases, the glass is actually etched and the only solution is to replace it.

Sometimes we find water softener or conditioner will help. If this fails, sprinkle a little rust remover powder on a wet cloth or sponge and rub vigorously. Copper cleaners have been successful for removing spots in some areas. Also try rubbing with a soap-filled steel wool pad.

(Editor's Note—We find that in the Nyssa area straight vinegar does a pretty good job.)

CURTAINS CAN BE MADE FLAME-RESISTANT

by home treatment. However, the flame-retardant solution is not effective on man-made fibers such as nylon, Orlon and acetate. But rayon can be treated.

This treatment is not fire-proof. The fabric will char and be destroyed. However, it will not burst into flame and spread the fire to surrounding areas.

Because there are several types of solutions which can be used, and different ways to apply them, we cannot give full information here. Call your county extension office for a free bulletin, "Making Household Fabrics Flame Resistant."

IF YOU HAVE A SQUEAKY FLOOR

in your house, perhaps you can take care of it this way. Have someone go in the crawl space or basement beneath the floor. Then you walk slowly across the floor so that the exact point of the squeak can be noted. At this place have the person beneath the floor insert a one-inch wood screw upward to bind the sub-floor to the finish floor.

Maximum thickness of the two floors is 1½ inches, so don't use too long a screw or it will protrude.

WHICH SIZE EGG IS THE BEST BUY?

Extra large, large, medium or small? We put this question to Mary Holthouse, extension food marketing specialist at Oregon State university. She says that during the fall months, small eggs are often a good buy, but this will depend on prices of the different sizes.

For instance, if large AA eggs are 60 cents a dozen and small AA eggs are less than 44 cents, the small ones give more for the money based on actual weight of the eggs.

To help you decide the best buy at various prices, drop a card to Mary Holthouse, OSU, Corvallis, and she will send you a free "slide rule" which gives all the answers.

BACK TO SCHOOL MEANS HOMEWORK

for youngsters. They need a well-lighted nook for study as days continue to get shorter.

At long last, you can find good study lamps at reasonable prices. Look for the lamps tagged "Better Light, Better Sight Study Lamp." Made by several different manufacturers, they are required to meet rigid specifications.

These include a wide light distribution over the working area, soft shadows without direct or reflected glare, plus upward and outward light. The actual amount of light produced is within scientifically acceptable limits.

This is definite progress in the field of good lighting. Previous attempts to produce quality lighting at low cost have not been too successful.

These lamps are starting to come in to local stores and are also in some big mail order catalogs.

YOU WORK SMARTER, NOT HARDER

when you work with both hands.

Of course, it takes a little practice, but if you'll stay with the idea for a couple of rounds, you will save yourself time.

For instance, when dusting venetian blinds, put an old cotton glove on each hand. Dust both sides of a slat at once by grabbing it between your fingers. And each hand can work on a different slat.

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
