Get the Note Back!

Smith borrowed \$1,000 from Jackson and gave him his negotiable promissory note, secured by a mortgage on his (Smith's) house. The note was payable two years from date.

At the end of one year, Smith's fortunes had improved and he found himself in a position to pay off the note. Jackson accepted the \$1,000, plus interest, when it was tendered to him. He also gave Smith a validly executed release of mortgage. Smith didn't ask for the promissory note and Jackson did not return it.

At the end of the second year, Smith received a call from a Mr. Peterson who said he had purchased the note for \$900 from Jackson six months ago. He now demanded payment. When told by Smith that the note had been paid, Jackson denied any knowledge of it and showed that he was an innocent purchaser for value.

Would Smith have to pay again? The answer is "yes."

The promissory note was a negotiable instrument. The rule is that, if such an instrument is sold or transferred, before payment is due, to an innocent purchaser for value, the purchaser takes the instrument free of the defenses which the maker of the note would have against the payee. Therefore, the defense of payment would
