LEAVE FOR SWITZERLAND

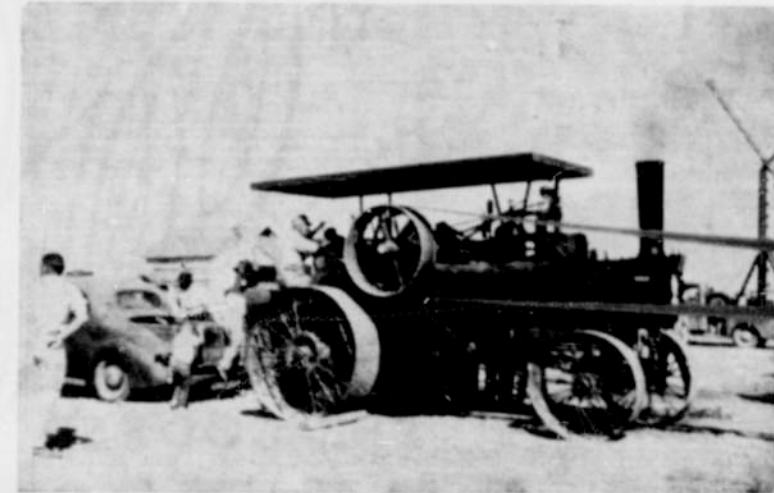

Oregon Vehicle Sale Set Saturday At Pendleton Lot

State of Oregon will hold its seventh annual vehicle sale of used cars and trucks at Pendleton Saturday, Sept. 17.

The sale will commence at 10 a.m. PDT on the parking lot of the Pendleton state office building, 700 S.E. Emigrant at Seventh, and will consist of 35 units including 22 sedans, two station wagons, six pickups and three dump trucks. Several four-wheel drive units are among them and many of these vehicles have low mileage.

A Smith & Wesson .38 caliber revolver will also be offered for sale.

Inspection of the vehicles may be made between the hours of 9 a.m. and 6 p.m. PDT, Sept. 15-16 and from 8 a.m. Sept. 17 until sale time. It is anticipated that these vehicles will be sold in approximately 1½ hours.

Bid security deposit will be required only from successful bidders who have until Sept. 20, 1966, to complete payment for any item purchased. Final payments for any vehicle shall be in the form of cashier's or certified check, cash, money order or personal check. The latter will be accepted as payment in full on day of sale only.
