Work Smarter . . . Not Harder

BEFORE THE FALL WHIRL OF ACTIVITIES SWAMPS YOU

... make a time plan. Now, don't say, "It won't work for me." Instead, think of what it might do for you—save frustration, confusion, energy and help you get more done.

It doesn't have to be a stop-watch, straight-laced schedule. It is just a guide. You can change it anytime you see a better way.

First, a plan should be simple and flexible. Keep in mind things that have to be done, ought to be done and your "hope to's." Avoid peak loads by doing some parts in advance of the deadline.

Alternate hard and easy, mental and physical, and liked with disliked tasks. Allow a catch-up period, better in the middle than at the end of the day. This will help make up for inevitable interruptions.

LEAKY FAUCETS COST MONEY

... especially if the leak is from the hot water line. Usually the trouble is a worn-out washer.

You can replace this yourself in the usual compression-type fixture. First, turn off water supply directly below the faucet. Then open the faucet and drain out any water.

Next, wrap a cloth around the cap nut (just below the handle) to protect the chromium. With an adjustable wrench, unscrew the cap nut, remove handle and spindle section. You'll see a small washer held in place by a brass screw.

Remove the screw, using a few drops of kerosene to loosen, if necessary. Then replace the washer with a new one and re-assemble the faucet.

It's a good idea to keep extra washers on hand.

YOUNG HOMEMAkers

... Here are some tips for cutting food bills. Mary Holthouse, extension food marketing specialist at Oregon State university reminds us that main-dish protein foods require the largest share of the food dollar.

Learning to use the less expensive cuts of meat, meat alternatives and making cost comparisons in the store will save on your budget.

The most tender meat cuts cost more, but the food value is approximately the same as for a less expensive cut containing the same amount of meat. Also compare prices on the basis of cost per serving rather than cost per pound.

Two large eggs, a half-cup of cottage cheese or three ounces of cheddar cheese provide almost as much protein as a three-ounce serving of meat.

Other low-cost protein alternatives are a cup of baked beans or a fourth-cup of peanut butter. Red snapper, perch or other trawl fish caught off the Oregon coast usually carry a smaller price tag than salmon.

MELON RINDS AND VEGETABLE WASTE

... can keep your waste disposer plenty busy at this time of year. When the load is too heavy, the motor gets hot and automatically stops.

If this happens to you, let it rest and cool for about 15 minutes. Carefully remove part of the load. The motor has a small overload button, usually on the bottom, which you can push and it should operate again. Check your instruction book for more information about location of the overload button.

If the unit still does not operate, check to see if a fuse has blown or a circuit breaker has tripped; or, the grinders may be jammed. Your instruction manual can also help you on this.
