

City Librarian Reviews New Books Available to Readers of Nyssa Area

Mrs. Max Urry, city librarian, reports the following books are now available to local patrons.

ADULT BOOKS

"Oregon for the Curious" by Ralph Friedman. A complete and useful overall guide of our state, and crammed with delightful off-the-beaten-track information.

"The Harmon Killebrew Story" by Hal Butler. This book tells how Harmon started playing baseball when he was eight and at 17 had signed a bonus contract with the Washington Senators. The author believes this small-town (Payette) Idaho boy will some day see his name emblazoned in baseball's Hall of Fame in Cooperstown.

"U.S. Warships of World War II" by Paul H. Silverstone. Here is the most complete and comprehensive handbook ever compiled on the United States Naval forces.

"The Double Image" by Helen MacInnes. Here is suspense at its most thrilling heights, derived (as always) from Helen MacInnes' acute insight and research into political events and espionage practices, and artfully blended into a magnificent novel.

"A Thousand Days" by Arthur M. Schlesinger Jr. This work is not a comprehensive history of the John F. Kennedy years, but a personal memoir by one who served in the White House during the Kennedy administration.

"Flyin' Saucers, Serious Business" by Frank Edwards. What is the truth about the strange objects that come down from the sky? What are these unidentified flying objects? Where do they come from? Are there intelligent creatures in them?

"A Gift of Prophecy" by Ruth Montgomery. This is the story of Jeane Dixon who publicly foretold President Kennedy's assassination and other world-shaking events. These and many fascinating new predictions are documented in this volume.

"Papa Hemingway" by A. E. Hotchner. A personal memoir by the author.

"Widows Wear Weeds" by Erle Stanley Gardner writing as A. A. Fair. Bertha Cool and Donald Lam are in top form in this fast-paced mystery featuring birds (potential jail variety), blondes (real and questionable) and blackmail.

"Code Three" by Rick Raphael. This is a novel, set in a centuries-from-now time, about the fabulous million-mile North American continental throughway system which extends from Alaska to the southern tip of Mexico.

"The Case of the Innocent Victims" by John Creasey. This new Superintendant West story opens with a particularly horrifying crime—the suffocation of an infant in his crib.

"Rebecca" by Daphne du Maurier. A brilliant novel of an unforgettable woman.

Junior High School

Following completion of the first quarter of the school year, in November, parents of junior high students are scheduled for parent-teacher conferences.

Purpose of these are to discuss mental, physical and emotional problems which might interfere with pupils' school adjustments.

A major activity among junior high students is the annual science fair, scheduled each spring.

High School Level

There are a number of opportunities for parents of high school students to visit the plant. As is the case in junior high, the high school also holds parent-teacher conferences.

A schedule is usually formulated, following the first grading period. A major event for graduating seniors and their parents is "career day."

At this time, selected speakers from various vocations talk with seniors and answer questions about their fields of interest.

An attempt is made to plan visitations in the various buildings without overlapping schedules, thus giving parents an opportunity to give their full attention to each child at each grade level.

Child Study Clubs

Parents can best help the school by working together through parent-teacher associations and similar organizations, so that they will know more fully the need of parental cooperation. Also where that cooperation is most needed to brace weak points in the system.

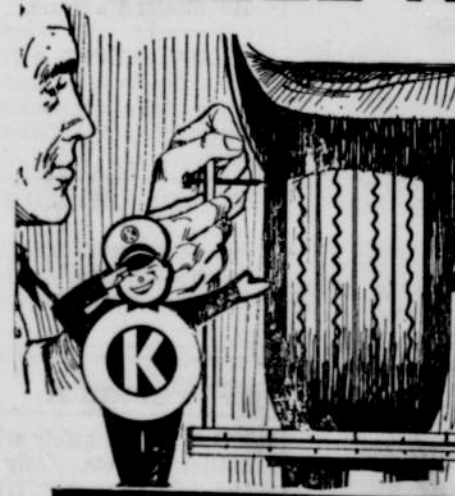
