Bishop Kelly Blanks Bulldogs 34-0: Friday Game Set at Payette

The Nyssa Bulldogs lost their homecoming tilt 34-0 to the Black Knights of Bishop Kelly last Friday evening when the Boise squad invaded Oregon territory.

The Knights scored in the first quarter on an aerial and then again in the second stanza on a two-yard plunge to lead 13-0 at halftime. The Idaho team tallied 21 points in the third quarter and both squads failed to score in the final stanza.

In comparing statistics, the Knights gained 273 yards rushing and 122 yards passing, while the Bulldogs had 138 yards rushing and 65 yards passing. Nyssa picked up 12 first downs in comparison to 15 for the Knights.

The victory gave the Bishop Kelly team a 3-0 record, while the Bulldogs have yet to win a game. The NHS lads travel to Payette Friday evening to meet the Pirates.

six in possession. Here again deer hunters heading for timbered ridge tops will undoubtedly toss in the shotgun to take advantage of this added hunting opportunity.

Prospects for the coming seasons appear good to excellent depending on the area to be hunted. Weather will be a deciding factor whether sportsmen hunt deer, grouse or partridge. State-wide game supply is generally good this year.

Hunters' Knowledge Important

But the animals become available to the average hunter only as weather patterns work to the hunter's favor. In addition, individual hunter success will depend on just how well he knows the country and the habits of the animal he is hunting.

Hunters can expect slow going through southeast desert ranges. Again, low fawn production a year ago will reduce yearling buck opportunities, but hunters will find good numbers of older bucks in this wide-open country.

Chukar hunters should enjoy excellent gunning in a number of areas this year. Populations are high throughout the Snake river breaks, as well as the rimrock canyons of Baker, Wallowa and Union counties.

Top gunning is also expected from northern Malheur county. The Deschutes canyons are expected to produce well with good coveys reported throughout.

Chukar populations are reported down in the southeastern section of the state, all the way from the upper Malheur drainage south through the Steens and Whitehorse country. Chukars are present but scattered.

Hungarian partridge are up from last year and hunters can expect fair shooting in some areas. Best bet appears to be the grain-growing regions and open sagelands through Umatilla, Union, Baker and northern Malheur counties.

For blue and ruffed grouse, hunters should hit the tops of the high ridges in the Wallowa, Whitman and Umatilla national forests. Look for the blues along the more open ridge tops and the ruffs in the brushier country.
