Let's help them understand they must produce more, and then help them do it. Not by cutting the work week "to spread the work." (All that does is spread poverty by raising costs and prices.) Not by emphasizing minimum wages but by emphasizing maximum productive earnings. Not by teaching hatred of the prosperous but by stimulating ambition to join them.

LETTER To the Editor

Dear Editor:

Are we to retain the freedom of selecting our own vitamins and other food supplements without a doctor's prescription?

I understand that on Dec. 14, 1966, a regulation, released by Commissioner James L. Goddard of the Food and Drug administration, can go into effect. This would limit the without-prescription sale of dietary supplements to very small amounts.

The price of these prescription vitamins will be much more expensive and prohibitive to many thousands of people.

I am giving one example by quoting Adelle Davis, nationally well-known nutritionist: "I myself formerly paid \$1 for 100 tablets of folic acid, five milligrams each. On a prescription this same vitamin cost me \$6.60 for 60 tablets of one milligram each—an increase of 5400 percent."

I might add, that with the additional cost of an office call to the doctor, this prescription would cost at least \$10—a \$9 increase over the original price of the vitamins.

What can we do? Each one of us can write short, effective letters objecting to the FDS food supplement regulations and state that we will not vote for anyone unwilling to suppress them.

Send one letter each to President Johnson at the White House, to both Oregon Senators Wayne Morse and Maurine Neuberger, c/o Senate Office building, and to U. S. Representative Wendell Wyatt at the House Office building—all in Washington, D.C.

I believe our letters will count!

Well-Known Etymologist to Speak At Meeting of Knife and Fork Club

Dr. Rowland M. Myers, well-known etymologist, will be guest speaker at the Knife and Fork club meeting set at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 6, at East Side cafe in Ontario.

The featured speaker has spent 25 years in research of the English language and studied at universities in Mexico, France, Germany, Italy and Spain.

He received a doctor of philosophy degree from Johns Hopkins, has taught in five American universities and was chosen to instruct a course in literature for U. S. officer personnel at the government's military school in England.

Dr. Myers says, "The average high school and college student seems to have a natural apathy toward the study of literature. The method in which it has been taught probably is as much to blame as anything."

"Actually there isn't anything any more universally useful or interesting than knowing something about the English language, the history and transformation of its words."
