Hatfield Renews Request for Aid To Area Stockmen

Governor Mark Hatfield said last week he has renewed his request to Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman that feed grain assistance be granted to livestock men in Wallowa, Union, Baker, Malheur, Grant, Crook and Harney counties.

The governor had requested emergency assistance for these drought-struck counties during August. Secretary Freeman replied earlier this month that he didn't think conditions were bad enough to warrant action.

The governor said stockmen have reported that recent rains came too late to be of help, and that a feed grain supplement will be needed to get their herds through the winter.

The emergency livestock feed program is made available under the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. If granted by Secretary Freeman, cow-calf ranchers can buy government grain (surplus) at 75 percent of the county support price.

Eastern Oregon cattlemen, forced to pasture herds on hay fields this summer because of the drought, say they will have to sell down to their basic breeding stock because they cannot afford to import hay and feed grains.

Larry Williams, president of the Oregon Cattlemen's association, told the governor that some herds are being liquidated entirely, while some ranchers are partially reducing their herds because of the high cost of feed. He said the situation is complicated by the high cost of money available from banks and loan institutions.
