Fence Approval Time Extended

Ranchers seeking approval for fences built on public lands in years gone by have been given an additional three months in which to apply.

Most range improvements on public lands in Oregon and Washington—such as fences and water developments—already are government-owned or are covered by permits or cooperative agreements, Bureau of Land Management officials in Portland report.

The previously set deadline of Sept. 30 has been extended to Dec. 31 to give remaining livestock operators time to seek approval for other privately constructed improvements.

All range improvements—fences, water developments, livestock and wildlife forage, brush control, roads, etc.—are cooperatively planned to be consistent with multiple use needs, bureau spokesmen point out.

Nyssa City Librarian Reports List Of Non-Fiction Books Now Available

According to Mrs. Max Urry, Nyssa librarian, the following non-fiction books are now available to area patrons.

"The If Reader of Science Fiction," edited by Frederik Pohl. This is an outstanding anthology of tales of tomorrow from the popular magazine, "The Worlds of If Science Fiction." In this collection every science fiction reader will find a story tailored to his exact tastes. Some of the stories are fanciful; others are horrifyingly suspenseful—but all of them are unforgettable.

"Santo Domingo: Revolt of the Damned" by Dan Kurzman. This book was written for all concerned citizens who want to know the truth about the recent events in the Dominican Republic.

"Tinkerbell" by Robert Manry. This book tells how a dream became a deed. It is the story of the 13½-foot sloop, Tinkerbell, believed to be the smallest boat ever to cross the Atlantic non-stop.

"Jeep Trails to Colorado Ghost Towns" by Robert L. Brown. For this book the author has selected 57 Colorado settlements from a much larger list of possible choices where enough still remains at the site to be of interest to the visitor.

"The Story of Alaska" by Clarence L. Andrews. With an area greater than that of Norway, Sweden and Denmark combined, with a climate like theirs and with natural resources greater than these countries have, Alaska is fast drawing the serious attention of the world.

"My Life for Beauty" by Helena Rubinstein. Born into a family of modest means, Mme. Rubinstein became a princess by marriage, queen in her own right of a beauty empire of six continents, a multimillionaire, international hostess, friend and patroness of some of the century's great artists.

"1001 Western Garden Questions Answered" by Norvell Gillespie. A noted garden authority answers questions about the problems of the home garden in the western United States.

"The Case for Going to the Moon" by Neil Ruzic. As opposed to the purely scientific and political approach, the author maintains and explains why science and space travel should have a practical purpose.

"A Schoolmaster With the Blackfeet Indians" by Douglas Gold. Son of a missionary to the Indians, the author traveled from Pennsylvania to teach school for almost 20 years on a Montana reservation. His record of events and experiences provide the material for this book.

"World Faiths" by Liva Baker. The author describes the major religions of mankind, pointing out their great similarities and differences, in terms intelligible and exciting, especially to young people.

"Who Gets the Drumstick?" by Helen Beardsley. The author tells her own story—that of a widow (with eight children) and widower (with 10 children) who met, fell in love, married and lived happily ever after.

"Sin, Sex and Self-Control" by Norman Vincent Peale. This book is a practical, common-sense, inspiring challenge to the individual. Dr. Daniel Poling says that "inevitably this is a best seller but more importantly it may become the moral pivot of our time."

"Favorite Poems Old and New," selected by Helen Ferris. This collection contains over 700 poems by great poets of the past and today, all beloved by young readers and chosen by the former editor of the Junior Literary Guild.

"A Gift of Joy" by Helen Hayes. A collection of the author's thoughts, reminiscences and anecdotes, this book expresses the very personal philosophy of a woman who has enjoyed self-fulfillment in both her professional and private life.

"Youth in Crisis" by Otto Shaw. A radical approach to delinquency is offered by the author, who founded and operates the famous Red Hill school in England on the principle of respect and understanding for the young offender.

"The Fastest Men on Earth" by Paul Clifton. This is the complete story of the world land speed record of 600.601 miles per hour set by Craig Breedlove in his jet-powered vehicle on Utah's Bonneville salt flats.

"I've Decided I Want My Seat Back" by Bill Mauldin. The 200 entries in this book comprise a cartoon history of the past five years and cover such diverse topics as the Cuban crisis, the Sino-Soviet dispute, the 1964 presidential race and the war in Vietnam.

"They Harvest Despair" by Dale Wright. The author is a New York newspaper writer who worked for six months as a migrant laborer along the Atlantic seaboard. His chronicles on the working conditions provide the material for this report.

"The Original Roget's Thesaurus of English Words and Phrases." The classic treasury of English words—synonyms, antonyms, parallel and related words—first published in 1852 by Peter Roget and now revised and modernized for American usage.
