

Accidental Gunshot Wound Claims Life of Adrian Sophomore Student



An apparent accidental self-inflicted gunshot wound Saturday claimed the life of Perry Lee Charland, 16-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Irvin Charland of route 2, Nyssa.

According to state police officers, the Adrian high school sophomore had returned from a hunting trip with other members of the family and decided he would go hunting again near their rural home in the Mitchell Butte area.

After taking a .22 pistol and leaving the house, his mother found him lying in the yard and discovered that he had been shot in the abdomen with the firearm he had been carrying.

The youth was rushed to Malheur Memorial hospital in Nyssa where he succumbed a short time after being admitted.

Funeral services were conducted at 4:30 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 4, 1966, at Lienkaemper chapel. Officiating was the Rev. Wallace Prowell of the Nyssa Christian church.

Perry Lee was born July 28, 1950, in Ontario and attended Adrian schools where as a freshman he was a member of the baseball team. His favorite hobby was hunting, but he also collected stamps and built model airplanes.

In addition to his parents, Irvin and Lucille Chadd Charland, he is survived by a sister, Barbara of the home. Also surviving is a great-grandmother, Emma Maier of Calloway, Neb.

Burial was made in the Nyssa cemetery. Pallbearers were young friends, Rex Smith, Steve Derrick, John Franks, Pat Savage, Bruce Campbell and Dan Cutler.

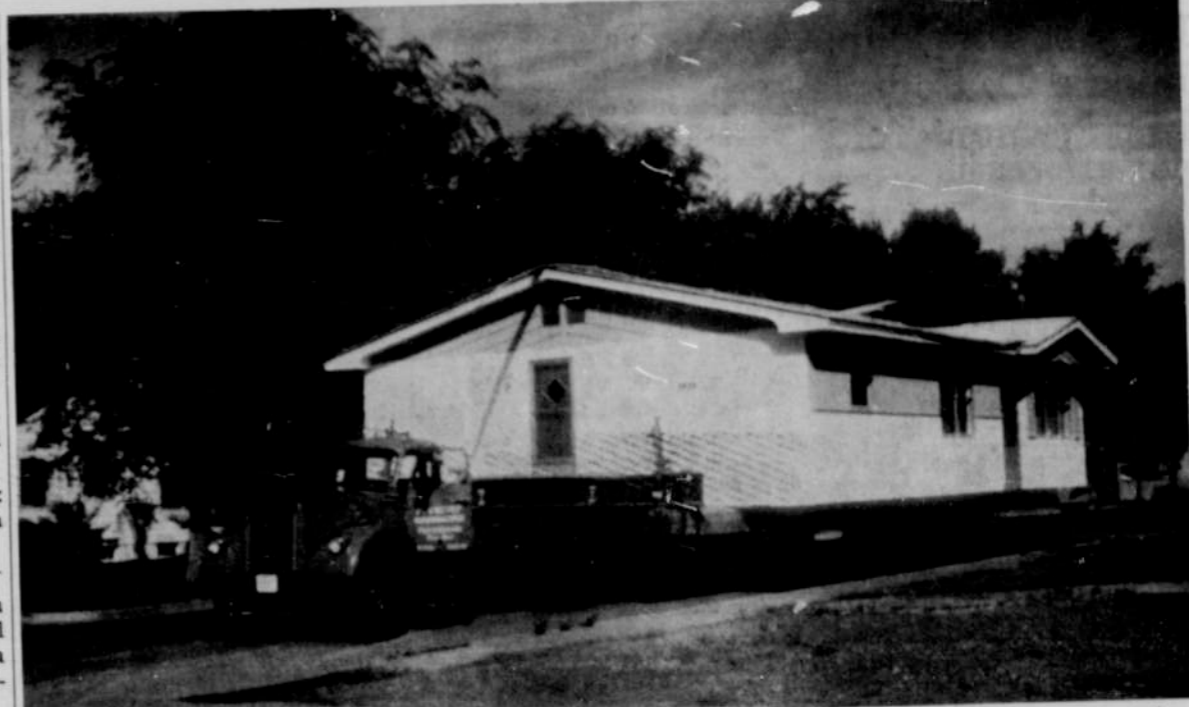
Mr. Dickson succumbed Saturday in Ontario after suffering a second heart attack. He had been hospitalized there after a first attack about a month ago.

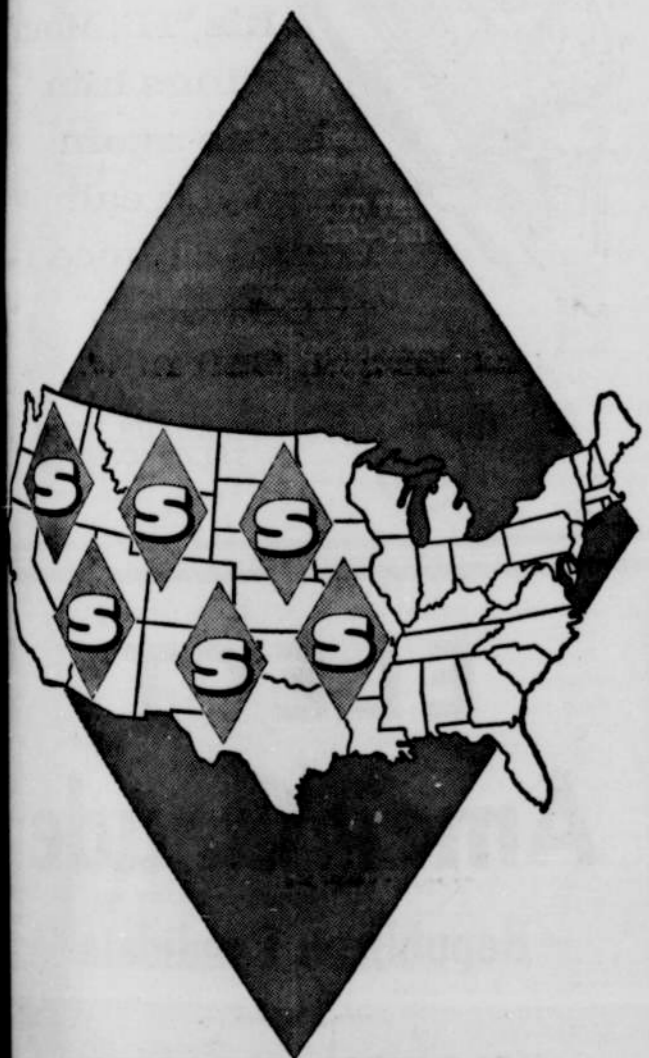

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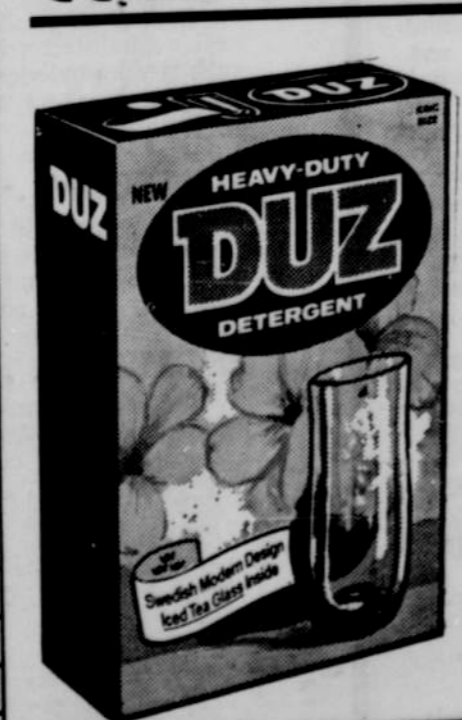
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
