BRIDES, DON'T FRET
... if just before your mother-in-law comes for a visit you break the vase she gave you. The new epoxy plastic glues can do wonders, if you have the pieces, of course.

These glues are among the most versatile modern plastics and one of the strongest adhesives. They can be used to mend furniture, fill cracks in walls or woodwork, or bond similar or dissimilar materials together.

You can get these products at your drug store, two tubes to a package, which you mix just before use. Be sure to follow directions on the label.

YOUR DRYER CAN DO MANY JOBS
... to help you shift from summer into fall living.

To remove mothball odors or the musty smell in stored-away blankets, other woens or draperies, put them in the dryer one at a time.

Allow each to tumble for about 10 minutes at low heat. If your dryer has a "no heat" setting, so much the better.

Steam wrinkles out of stored wool slacks and suits with the help of a dryer. Put garments in the dryer with two damp bath towels. Tumble for about five minutes, then hang on non-rust hangers to dry. Press if necessary.
