LDS Rites Held For Glen Suiter, Accident Victim

A 69-year-old former Nyssan, Glen A. Suiter of Eagle, Idaho, was crushed to death Saturday morning, Oct. 8, 1966, when a tractor he was driving fell 20 feet from the top of a silage pile.

Ada County Coroner E. D. Paris said that Suiter was bulldozing ground cattle feed at the Double-R Cattle company ranch near Eagle, and it appeared that the tractor fell on him after going over the top of the ensilage pile.

Funeral services were conducted Tuesday morning at the Nyssa LDS stake house with Bishop Glenn Peterson officiating.

Mr. Suiter was born Nov. 28, 1896, at Valley, Wash., and attended schools at Spokane. He began farming in Treasure Valley in 1920 and resided in the Wilder, Nyssa, Caldwell and Eagle areas.

He was married in 1922 to Mary Melvina Evans, a sister of the late Alfred Evans, former husband of Mrs. Vivian Bowns. He served during World War I and was a member of the Meridian American Legion post. Mr. Suiter also served as a board member of the Farmers Home administration at Caldwell.

In addition to his widow of the home, he is survived by two sons, D. Marion Suiter of Phoenix, Ariz., and Clarence D. Suiter of Boise; one daughter, Mrs. Norma Jean of Phoenix.

Other survivors include a brother, Stanley Suiter of Wallace; two sisters, Mrs. Mina Selders and Mrs. Grace Berner, both of Homedale; 13 grandchildren and one great-granddaughter.

Interment was made in the Nyssa cemetery under direction of Lienkaemper chapel. Pallbearers were D. W. Gearhart, Art McKay, Joe Fanning, Paul Akin, Harry Gahan and Jim Malloy.

Bill Jacobs Performs For Grade Schoolers

Presenting a "one-man band" to the elementary grades Oct. 7, William Jacobs performed on a variety of musical instruments. The marimba was his main instrument. He explained that the keyboard was made of rosewood from Honduras. The instrument originated in China.

One of Jacobs' own homemade instruments was called a "squeeze-play" and was constructed from turned bicycle horns. Another device was made from small frying pans. Nails arranged in a box made another instrument.

Jacobs also played an instrument made from Swiss bells. His latest invention is made from bottles of water, tuned by raising or lowering the water levels. The water is colored differently in each bottle.

George McKee Rites Conducted At Nyssa Chapel

Funeral rites for George McKee, a 55-year resident of Treasure Valley, were conducted Tuesday afternoon, Oct. 11, 1966, at Lienkaemper chapel. Officiating was the Rev. J. J. Fleming of Wilder.

Mr. McKee succumbed Saturday at Malheur Memorial hospital after an illness of one week.

He was born Oct. 23, 1891, at New Hope, Ontario, Canada, and was married in 1913 to Ella Vera Armstrong at Boise.

The deceased had resided in the Wilder and Nyssa areas for 55 years and before his retirement worked as a machinist for the Bureau of Reclamation and North Board of Control.

Mr. McKee was affiliated with the Masonic lodge for 51 years and was a charter member of the Wilder chapter. He was also a veteran of World War I.

In addition to his widow of the home, he is survived by one son, Jack McKee of The Dalles, Ore.; and a daughter, Mrs. George (Delmar) Schweizer of Portland. Eleven grandchildren and 14 great-grandchildren also survive.

Interment was made in the Nyssa cemetery. Pallbearers were Edwin Brush, Andy Brewer, Henry Flenor, William Hall, Lyle Sabin and Burt Trueblood, all members of Wilder Lodge No. 83, AF and AM.

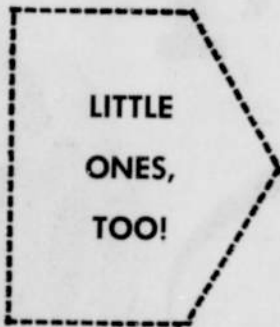
