New books going into circulation recently at Malheur county library in Ontario include the following.

"Peace in Vietnam" by the Society of Friends. Paths of action America can follow to halt the war's expansion and to bring the destruction of human life and property to an end in Vietnam.

"Vietnamese Legends" by George F. Schultz. A collection of 32 stories which reflect the history and Vietnamese way of thinking.

"1066: The Story of a Year" by Denis Butler. A month-by-month chronicle of the events of 1066.

"The Future" by Theodore J. Gordon. An outstanding young engineer considers the world toward which our present technology is leading us and its potential for achievement or disaster.

"Wings of Gold" by Roger A. Caras. The story of U.S. Naval aviation.

"My Husband the Doctor" by Maxine Schnall. The wife of an obstetrician takes you on an excursion "behind the scenes" in an amusing book.

"Joy to My Heart" by Gene Gleason. The true story of nurse Annie Skau, medical missionary to China and Hong Kong.

"Cowboy at the Mike" by Curt Gowdy. The autobiography of a great sports announcer.

"Short Drive, Sweet Chariot" by William Saroyan. An account of a drive from New York to California.

"Fell's Guide to Investing in United States and Foreign Coins" by John J. Abbott. A practical guide to the financial growth potential in the coin investment field.

"What Is Aikido?" and "Aikido: The Art of Self-Defense," both by Koichi Tohei. An explanation of what Aikido is and instructions that explain in detail this art of self defense.

"Writer's Market '66." A convenient and complete source of information on the names and addresses of markets for freelance writers, photographers and cartoonists.

"The Gates of the Forest" by Elie Wiesel. A novel that tells the personal emotions of a young Jew fleeing from Nazi persecution.

"Northward the Coast" by Edward Lindall. A novel of escape and pursuit in the tropical wilderness of the Northern Territory.

"His First Minute After Noon" by Sally Daniels. The story of a young woman's search for self-understanding when her outwardly ideal marriage collapses.

"Quota" by Jean Bruller. A novel that is a satire on America's affluent society.

"The House at Satan's Elbow" by John Dickson Carr. A Dr. Fell detective novel.

"The Disturbing Death of Jenkin Delaney" by Michael Bonner. A western novel.

"The Red, White and Black Continent" by Herbert Wendt. A first-hand briefing on Latin America today, covering the Caribbean Islands, Mexico and Central America as well as South America.

"Something to Hide" by Nicholas Monsarrat. A story of crime and retribution.

"Foxe's Book of Martyrs," edited by G. A. Williamson. History of the persecutions of Protestants such as John Bunyan, Martin Luther and John Calvin.

"The Army Wife" by Nancy Shea. What a woman should know about the customs of the service and management of an army household.

"Saturday the Rabbi Went Hungry" by Harry Kemelman. A mystery story.

"Lionheart" by Alexander Fullerton. A novel about John Fowler, his eight-year-old son Andrew, an escaped lion and a delightful cast of characters, including Andrew's dearly loved and recently deceased grandfather.

"The Hands of Innocence" by Jeffrey Ashford. A Walker mystery.

"A Square of Sky" by Janina David. Recollections of the author, who is Jewish and was a nine-year-old in war-torn Warsaw and saw friends disappear as they and others were harried by the Gestapo.

"The Eleanor Roosevelt Story" by Archibald MacLeish. This biography of Eleanor Roosevelt covers her shy childhood and youth, marriage to Franklin D. Roosevelt and the period following his death.

"Rush to Judgement" by Mark Lane. A critique of the Warren commission's inquiry into the assassination of President Kennedy.

"The Time Between the Wars" by Jonathan Daniels. A history from the jazz age and the depression to Pearl Harbor.

"Church Cooperation: Dead-End Street or Highway to Unity?" by Forest L. Knapp. A thorough analysis of the promise and the peril of interfaith cooperation.

"Age of Enlightenment" by Peter Gay. A pictorial and textual survey of the philosophical, scientific and cultural life of 18th-century Europe.

"Shakespeare, Our Contemporary" by Jan Kott. The author sees a connection between the Elizabethan plays and our modern Theatre of the Absurd.

"Shakespeare: The Tragedies" by Clifford Leach. A collection of critical essays.

"Language and Literacy Today" by Patrick D. Hazard. The majority of selections in this book deal with spoken, written and printed language—language in general and the English language in particular.

"The Story of the U.S. Army Signal Corps" by Max L. Marshall. An account of the growth and development of the corps.

"The School Children Growing Up in the Slums" by Mary Frances Greene. A documentary report on school children by two young teachers in Harlem schools. Based on classroom conversations.

"Steps to Christian Unity," edited by John A. O'Brien. The crucial issues of Christian unity and renewal candidly discussed.

"The Great American Desert" by W. Eugene Hollon. After reviewing the history of the American desert area in the Rocky Mountain region, this book explains how its natural handicaps have been overcome.

"The Enigma of Out-of-Body Travel" by Suzy Smith. A book that draws together case histories categorized as traveling clairvoyance, self-projection and extrasensory travel.

"Corson's Inlet" by A. R. Ammons. A book of poetry.

"The Eagle and His Egg" by Mark Rascovich. A humorous novel of Paris between the wars, based on the author's own experiences.

"Silence" by Yuri Bondaryev. A novel of two young men in post-war Russia.

"Humorous Skits for Young People" by Robert Fontaine. A collection of royalty-free short plays and easy-to-perform comedy sketches for school and community use.

"The Complete Poetical Works of Browning." This Cambridge edition presents to the reader and the scholar an organized reprint, in one volume, of the works of Robert Browning.

"Alaska Today" by B. W. Denison. This informative book offers a comprehensive survey of contemporary Alaskan life, opportunities and present-day resources.

NON-FICTION READING

"Pro Quarterback: My Own Story" by Johnny Unitas. Considered by millions as the best professional quarterback who ever lived, Unitas tells his own personal story and his own perceptive analysis of football strategy and execution.
