## Oregon State University Makes Plans For U.S. Science Teacher Training

Oregon State university has been selected for the straight year to conduct special advanced training next year for high school science teachers from across the state.

The university has received a \$268,100 grant from the National Science Foundation (NSF) for an Academic Year Institute aimed at improving science teaching, President J. Jensen announced.

Jensen said the institute at Oregon State is part of a nationwide program to upgrade science teaching in the United States and to increase the number of top-quality teachers and scientists.

In 1957, when the program was originated, OSU was one of 16 universities NSF selected to start the training program. It has been on the list every year since then. Forty-two teachers expected. Forty-two teachers will be enrolled in the Academic Year institute in 1967-68. They will be drawn from the biological sciences, mathematics, physics, general science and chemistry. Two are expected from foreign countries.

Under the \$268,100 grant, recipients receive \$3,000 plus allowances for dependents, books and travel. Many of the teachers complete requirements for advanced degrees during their year at OSU.

This year, 39 of the participating teachers are from 15 states. Three other educators are from Italy, Korea and Australia. More than 500 high school teachers applied for the 42 spots.
