

Game Violations Charged to 21 Since Oct. 22

Since opening of the pheasant season, Oct. 22, a total of 21 persons have been charged with game law violations and appeared in E. Otis Smith's Justice court of Nyssa.

Charged with hunting with the aid of a motor vehicle and paying \$25 fines and \$5 court costs were William Altizer, Burns; Daniel Harold Fugate, Oakland, Ore.; Henry Carmelo Mendazona, Nyssa.

For failure to have a hunting license and paying the same fines and costs were Lynn Robinson, Boise; Ronald J. Walker, Nampa; Darwin Leon McConnell, Jordan Valley. Trial is pending for Thomas Law Hing of Tigard on the same charge.

For hunting during prohibited hours, with the same fines and costs, were Jack Gordon Smith, Burns; Dwane Edward Fisher, Burns; Joseph Marion Miller, Nyssa. Trial was set for Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock for Samuel Jay Cleaver on the same charge.

Illegal possession of game birds brought similar fines and costs to Thomas Law Hing, Tigard; James Howard Hambridge Jr., Medina, Wash.; and James Howard Hambridge Sr. of Lake Stevens, Wash. On an unplugged gun charge, the same "rap" was given Mike Castro Jr. and Joe Angelo Castro, both of Nyssa.

Keith Lee Langley and Danny Lee Pyles of Nyssa were charged the same for shooting across a public highway.

In addition to these, William Alfonso Barton was charged with an untaxed deer, Theodore William Olsen Jr. with exceeding the game bird bag limit (both of Nyssa) and Julius Reibert Groom of Myrtle Creek, Ore., with unlawful possession of a deer tag. All paid \$25 fines and \$5 court costs.

Three Portland hunters were fined \$10 in Judge Smith's court for trespassing following charges by the landowner.

The McCall lads scored late in the first quarter, and the Antelopes retaliated with a 25-yard touchdown pass from Tim Tallman to Pud Franks.

Steve Kriegh kicked the extra point and the halftime score read 7-7.

Midway in the third quarter, Tallman broke loose for a 35-yard scoring jaunt and Kriegh again made the "point-after" good.

This win gives Adrian second place spot in the SRV-B league, northern division, having been downed only by the unbeaten first place Parma Panthers. Parma's SRV-B record now stands at five wins, no losses, while the Antelopes are 4-1.

The Adrian lads will host a tough, inspired Wilder team tomorrow night. The Idaho squad holds a 3-2 record in the SRV-B, southern division.

The Homedale Trojans hold the championship spot among southern division teams with a 5-0 tally.

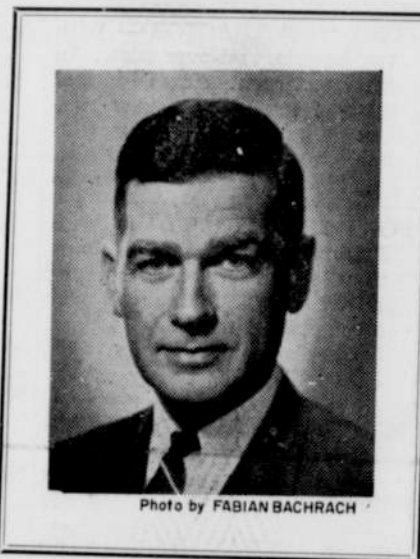

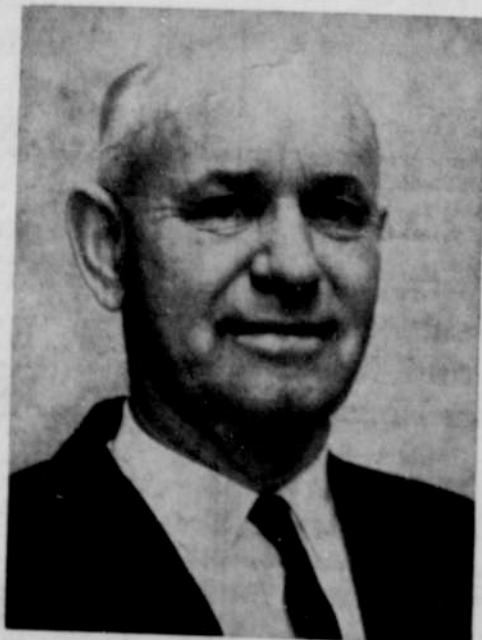
