We cannot imagine a weekly editor who hasn't wondered about these questions. He gets cussed for what he puts in the paper—for what he leaves out—for the manner in which he described that which he did have printed.

With this last edition of our weekly before the general election it becomes highly important to us. If we endorse our candidates on a party basis, we are politically minded and want our special group to win, regardless of qualifications! If we split our tickets, we don't believe in the "Two Party System!"

With the feeling that we may be better read than most of our subscribers, due to our position and time, and, with the knowledge that we don't have superior intellect, we are going to recommend some candidates over others. We may be mistaken in our judgment and we know our following is very limited but this is our page and our opinion.

OREGON NATIONAL

Mark Hatfield, not because of his political image and the recognition he might give Oregon, but because of his character and willingness to lose an "almost sure" win if he had not crossed the administration on the Vietnam policy. He thinks for himself, has the courage to express his views and is not a rubber stamp for the spend, spend, spend into prosperity and eternal happiness of the Great Society.

Everett J. Thoren over Al Ullman—not based on experience or national recognition but because he feels that the people should be recognized as boss—not the labor unions or the Democratic party. I find myself unable to go along with a congressman who feels everyone should belong to a union to hold a job—(along with many other reasons that appal me that the lawmakers know more about how our federal taxes should be spent than the persons paying them).

After a term in office Thoren might turn out the same way, but let's give him a chance and then oust him if he does!

OREGON—STATE

Morcom, we know very little about other than by reputation of having done a good job after being appointed by the present county court to replace Homer Schnell, deceased. We have no quarrel with Mrs. Van Horn, but feel that Morcom is entitled to a full term of his own.

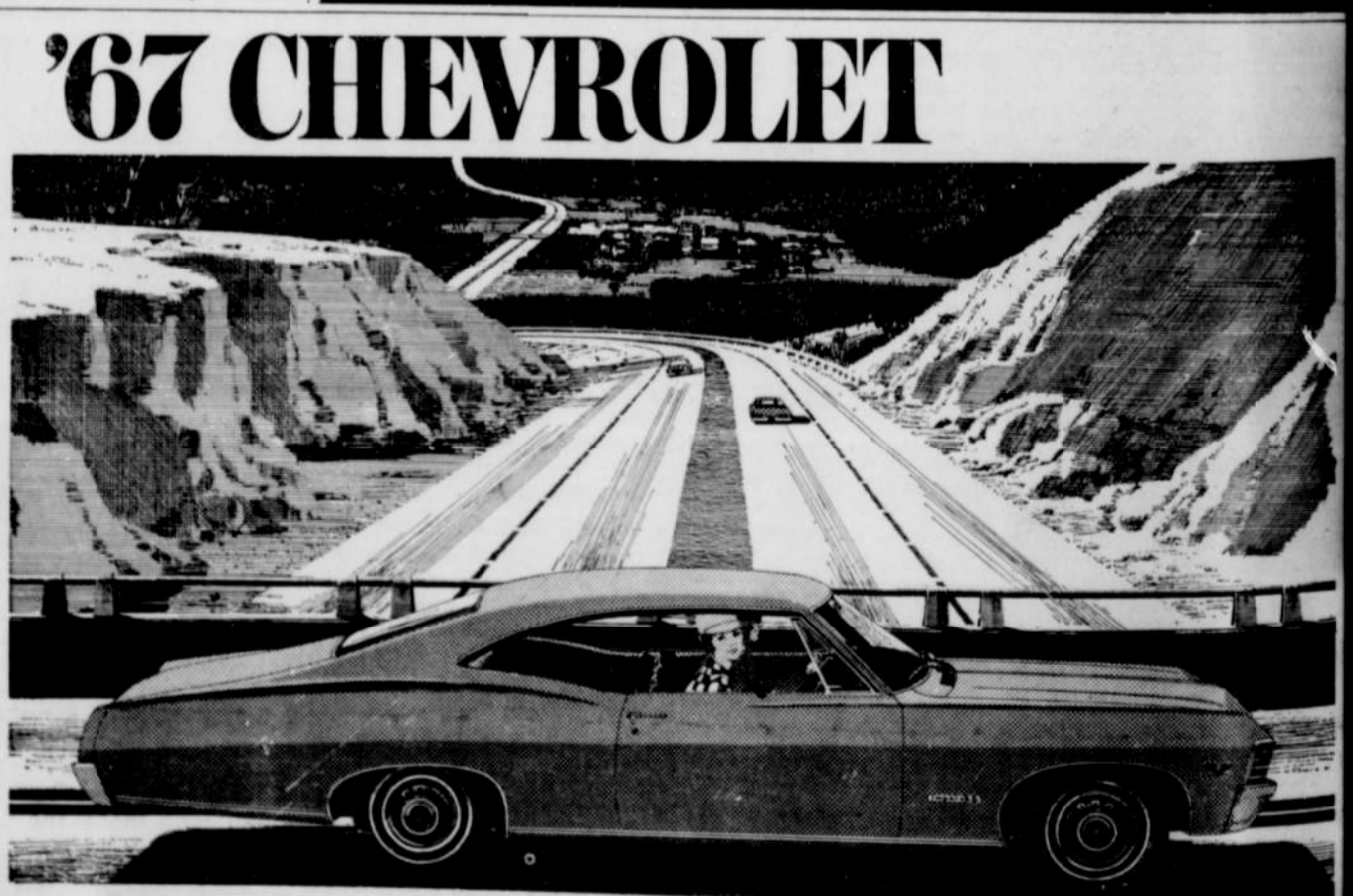
