GOP Re-Elects House Speaker F. F. Montgomery

F. F. (Monte) Montgomery, Eugene Republican, will be speaker of the Oregon House of Representatives for the next two years. His unanimous selection by the 38-member Republican caucus Nov. 11 in Salem was tantamount to the election as speaker.

Montgomery will be the second man in Oregon's history to be elected twice to the office of speaker. Montgomery is serving his fifth term in the House of Representatives from Lane county.

Montgomery said, "I am honored by this selection and I am gratified the voters of Oregon endorsed the record of the 1965 session by returning an increased Republican majority."

"We recognize Oregon faces a multitude of problems, including providing property tax relief, financing education, strengthening traffic safety legislation and others. We are, however, looking forward to another constructive hard-working session."

Of the 60 members, 47 have previous legislative experience, 28 of them Republicans and 19 Democrats.
