Mrs. Marie Moore attended a recent AKH Home Extension unit meeting at the home of Bobby Jo Sessions.

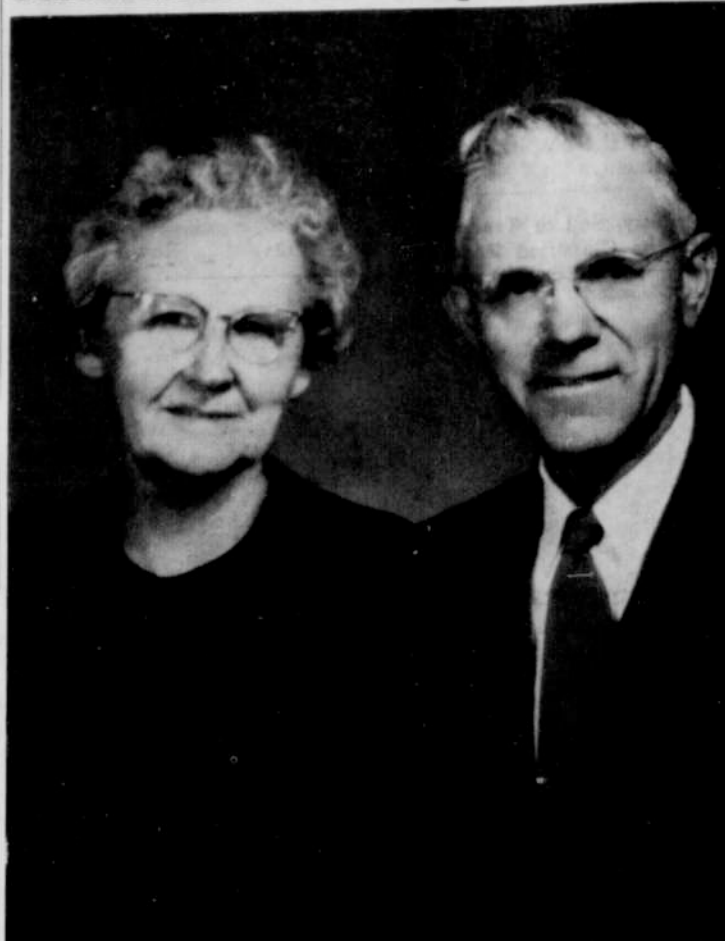
