Hospital Information Given

Hospital Board Chairman Stam gave the group background information as to why the board decided to approve the addition of a nursing home wing to the present hospital.

He said the hospital was just about breaking even, financially, month-in and month-out. Some times there would be a profit and some months a loss.

Factors having a direct bearing on the situation, he said, were: (1) A full staff was required at all times to be able to care for emergencies that arose, increaspatients in the hospital, proper, at most times to carry the cost; (3) State Employment service at increasingly shorter stays for patients; (4) a higher percentage of patients going out of town for mand the patient come to them.

Area Nursing Homes Filled

He also cited a need for the additional 30 beds that would be in the new nursing home wing, if voters approve the bond issue. He said the facilities at Vale and which institutions to consider. He Ontario are filled to capacity and the same was true in the local hospital.
