Additional employment opportunities are needed for Treasure Valley Community college students, according to Lois Peterson, placement officer for the Oregon State Employment service at TVCC.

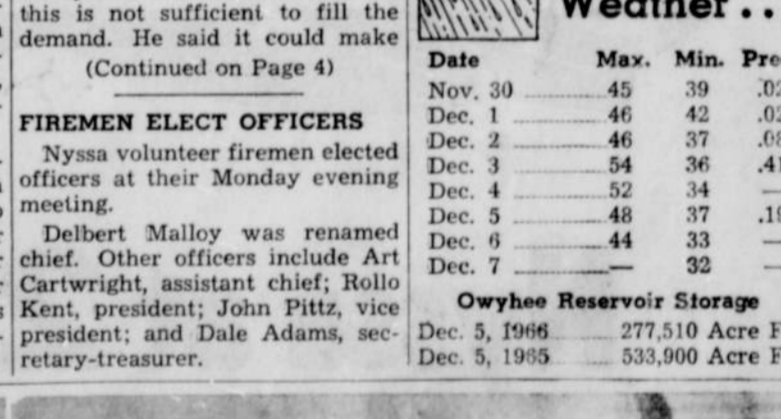

Owyhee Reservoir Storage

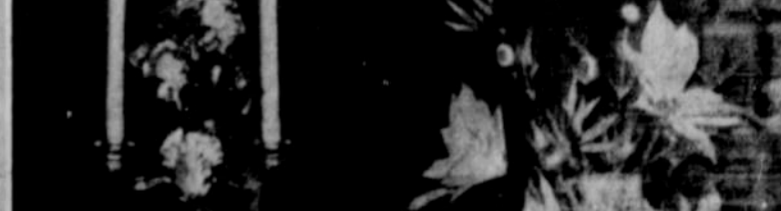
