Antelope Reservoir Chemically Treated For April Stocking

Antelope reservoir located in southeastern Oregon 12 miles southwest of Jordan Valley was chemically treated on Nov. 14 by the Oregon State Game commission.

This was done to eliminate an abundant population of bullhead catfish and rough fish which have been increasing in the reservoir since it was last treated in 1958. Due to the extremely dry summer, the reservoir was drawn down to a very low level and afforded an excellent opportunity for rehabilitation.

Populations of undesirable fish increased to the point where they were providing serious competition to all trout under 14 inches in length. Smaller trout were in very poor condition, while little indication of survival of the April plant of 100,000 rainbow fingerlings was observed.

Antelope reservoir is expected to be restocked with 100,000 rainbow fingerlings about April 1967. These fingerlings should be legal size by the end of the summer of 1967, the commission said.

IT'S YOUR LAW

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"FOUL BALL"

Each year some of the more than 100 million fans who watch or take part in sports get hurt by foul balls, flying pucks and the like. Many of them, however, get no damages from the show owner or promoter because the fan may voluntarily take a position in the audience where his chances of involvement in the physical event may cause the law to regard him as assuming and accepting the risks of such spectator activity.

The sports injury rules apply to strange events. In one rolling pin throwing contest, a pin went awry and knocked out a spectator. No recovery. It was an obvious risk that he undertook in standing within the range of the flying pins.

In another case in one state, contestants tried to see who could catch a hen. Some eager hen-catchers pushed a spectator and a participant through a plate glass window. No recovery.

As a general rule, by entering into the area of such physical activities, participants and spectators are accepting certain obvious risks. They do not, however, accept by their participation any acts of misconduct or misjudgment that are not inherent in the conduct of the sporting event.

Thus, a foul ball which causes injury during the course of a baseball game does not give rise to a right to recover damages, but a ball deliberately hit into the stands during practice may entitle the spectator to a recovery.

There are, however, occurrences that are not a necessary part of the sporting event or risks from which the promoter should reasonably protect the spectator. These are the reasons for protective walls for auto racing, screens behind home plate at baseball games or rules for the conduct of participants.

In golf, for instance, bad shots occasionally do injure someone. The person hitting a golf ball has two duties—to make sure that no one is exposed to an unreasonable risk by being within the area of play to which the golfer is playing and to give a loud warning to anyone who may be affected.

The call "fore" may be required either before or after the shot. If he abides by these rules, usu-

ally the golfer has no liability for the ball or club that hits someone, even though the ball "hooked" or "sliced" in the wrong direction.
