 The regular hospital rooms too few, in case of an emergency.

**Stabilize Income**

With more nursing home rooms the income could be calculated with much more certainty as the stay of most would be 30 days or more, with some living there the balance of their lives. The rooms would be utilized, as it is anticipated that when one patient leaves, there would be another to replace him soon.

Another factor, Stam said, was that a high percentage of charges for this service would be paid through Medicare. Regular patients quite frequently are treated and cared for without full pay, or frequently with none at all.

**Election Date Set**

Tuesday, Dec. 27, has been set for election on the bond issue of \$321,116. The balance needed for completion is available as a grant under the Hill-Burton act in the amount of \$129,000.

The board will decide at the regular meeting Dec. 13 the length of time for which the bonds will be issued for voter approval.

The hospital district is the same as Nyssa Road District No. 2. It includes Adrian and the rural area about two miles south on the west side of Snake river, about four to five miles west of Lytle boulevard and north of Nyssa approximately five miles.
