

Funeral Service Held Saturday For Retired Operator of Tire Firm



ED WILD Dies at Age 85

Funeral rites for Joseph Edwin (Ed) Wild were conducted Saturday afternoon, Dec. 3, 1966, at Nyssa Church of the Nazarene with the Rev. Jack Jamison officiating.

Mr. Wild, a 32-year resident of Nyssa, succumbed on the previous Wednesday afternoon following an extended illness.

He was born Oct. 18, 1881, in Waterville, Kan., a son of William and Martha Wild, and while a very young man began farming in Marshall county, Kan.

On Nov. 1, 1905, he married Ethel Mae Augustus, continued farming in the Sunflower state and in Oklahoma. The Wilds later moved by covered wagon to western Kansas, settled near Palco and continued to farm for 24 years there.

It was during this period that Mr. Wild donated a tract of land on which was built a small country church, given the name of Canaan chapel. The deceased became a member of this church which has continued as a spiritual "lighthouse" throughout the years and still has an active congregation.

Due to severe dust storms and extended drought conditions, Mr. and Mrs. Wild and son, Roy, left Kansas in April 1937, moved to Oregon and began operating OK Rubber Welder firms in Nyssa and New Plymouth. The deceased was active in the work until he retired in 1951.

Mr. Wild was a charter member of the local Nazarene church and served for several years a Sunday school superintendent.

In addition to his widow, he is survived by one son, Roy of Nyssa; two daughters, Mrs. Hilda Rathbun of LaPuente, Calif., and Mrs. Arlene Seward of the Apple Valley community. Also surviving are seven grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Mr. Wild was preceded in death by one son, Howard, who died when five years old, three brothers and a sister.

Interment was made in the Nyssa cemetery, under direction of Lienkaemper chapel.
