#### ADULT NON-FICTION

"Oregon's Historical Markers" by W. M. Scofield. Oregon's historical markers have great value and this book has been designed to permit all who are interested to discover for themselves these story-telling monuments which so dramatically link Oregon's past to the present.

"Our Trojan Horses" by Dr. John J. Mirich. A study of various fields of social behavior and social problems by the area's own professor of psychology at Treasure Valley Community college.

"Time Out, Ladies" by Dale Evans Rogers. A relaxed, informal conversation concerning some of the things that really count with women.

"Life in Mexico" by Fanny Calderon de la Barca. From the journals and letters of the author who was the spirited Scottish wife of the first envoy of Spain to independent Mexico.

"Terrible Trail: The Meek Cut-off, 1845," by Keith Clark and Lowell Tiller. This book describes the shortcut discovered by the Meek brothers to avoid difficulties endured by the emigrants in 1845.

"The International Nomads" by LaFranco Rasponi. The International Nomads, sometimes called the Jet Set, are the postwar version of what was called the Cafe Society. The author tells who they are and how, where and why they function.

"Claimed" by Francis Stevens. Here is one of the strangest and most compelling novels that you have read. A suspense-filled story dealing with a ship, the Portsmouth Belle.

"Range of Doom" by Tom Curry. The author has woven the pattern of his characters' lives into a tense, dramatic western.

"The Seven Story Mountain" by Thomas Merton. The autobiography of a young man who led a full and worldly life, and then, at the age of 26, entered a Trappist monastery.

"The Healing of Sorrow" by Norman Vincent Peale. How to face the sorrow of bereavement is one of life's most difficult problems. The author gives helpful suggestions to give solace to those who have lost a loved one.

"American Favorite Ballads" by Pete Seeger. A book for singing, containing more than 80 favorite folk songs in the versions sung and popularized by Pete Seeger.

"Christmas Treasures" by the editors of Hallmark. A new collection of Christmas art and writing in the holiday tradition.

"Home Study Course for Civil Service Jobs" by David R. Turner. The secret of getting a secure government job, complete in one volume.

"The Philosophy of Surrealism" by Ferdinand Alquié. Surrealism is life. It seeks not to create works of literature but to express man's inner nature—to love and to discover.

"The Folk Singer's Guitar Guide" by Jerry Silverman. An instructional manual for guitar players, with folk songs by Pete Seeger.

"Mr. Clemens and Mark Twain" by Justin Kaplan. A biography of the American genius who portrayed, named and in part exemplified America's "Gilded Age."

"The Coming Water Famine" by Jim Wright. An outspoken Texas Congressman reveals the frightening facts about our national water shortage—how drought, waste and pollution have escalated it and how we must deal with it.

"Over the Hill and Down the Creek" by Walter Youngquist. A story about the geologists who still explore the remote corners of the earth in search of oil and minerals.

"Psychology of Adolescence" by Luella Cole and Irma Nelson Hall. Newly revised edition of one of the most highly respected and widely used texts in adolescent psychology presents a modern, sound view of the subject.

"Your Wonderful Baby" by Willis J. Potts. A practical approach to baby and child care.

"A Literary History of Greece" by Robert Flaceliere. This book deals chronologically with all important works of Hellenic literature that are still of interest to contemporary readers.
